



DIRECTIONS:

From eastern central New Jersey: Take U.S. Route 22 West towards Lebanon, NJ. Automotive Restoration is just west of the Spinning Wheel Dinner, which is located on the East-bound lane of Rt. 22. The entrance is just before the Three Graces Bridal Shop/Manning Gallery/RC Collectables Building (1060 Rt. 22).

If you see Chelseas Restaurant and Pub on the East-bound lane you have just past the entrance to Automotive Restorations. If you miss the drive-way, take the next turn around and follow the directions below.

From western central New Jersey: Take U.S. Route 22 East towards Lebanon, NJ. Automotive Restoration is off of the west-bound lane of Rt. 22, just east of Chelseas Restaurant and Pub. NJ Region AACA Constitution & By-Laws

Participation Point Rules

General terms and conditions:

- Point year shall begin on December 1 and end on November 30.
- Member must legibly sign the sign-in sheet, including membership number.
- In the case of national meets, participating member must notify the Point Chair within 30 days.

- Point standings of the top 50 members will be published in the Road Map in May, July, September, and February.
- It is the chairman's responsibility to notify the Points Chair if an event includes a monetary donation.

In order for a meet or gathering of any type to be considered a point event by the Vice President, it shall satisfy the following criteria:

- 1. A member of the NJ Region must be the Meet Chairman or serve as the event coordinator.
- 2. All members of the NJ Region must be eligible to participate.
- 3. All AACA eligible vehicles must be eligible to participate.
- 4. The meet must be scheduled and placed on the calendar by the Vice President.
- 5. The event must be published at least once in the Road Map prior to the scheduled event or be the subject of an official email to all members at least 10 days in advance of the gathering.
- 6. In order for a member to receive points, adequate "participation in an event" shall be determined by the meet chairman or event coordinator. They may delete or strike a member's name from the sign-up sheet or participation sheet if, in their opinion, a member's participation is less than adequate.

Participation Point Rules

- 1. Attendance at a Region point meeting or event of any kind – 20 points.
- 2. Attendance at a Region Judging Seminar – 50 points.
- 3. AACA National meetings & events: Maximum number of points per event – 50 – except for participation on a National Tour as detailed below.

- a. Attendance at a National meeting or event of any kind - 20 points without AACA qualifying vehicle.
- b. Judge a National Meet 50 points
- c. Attending Judging Seminar or other training class - 50 points
- 4. Spring Meet points can be combined if a member performs multiple functions. No bonus "revenue generation" points will be earned for this event.
 - a. Chairman 300 points
 - b. Registrar 100 points
 - c. Chief Judge 100 points
 - d. Field Coordinator 100 points
 - e. Publication Coordinator 100 points
 - f. Gate coordinator 100 points
 - g. Safety coordinator— 100 points
 - h. Trophy coordinator 100 points
 - i. Book sale coordinator- 100 points
 - i. Bake sale coordinator 100 points
 - k. Volunteer
 - i. Judge 100 points
 - ii. All other "helpers" 50 points
- 5. Chair a "point event" (note in the case of co-chairs, points will be split)
 - a. Includes a monetary donation -200 points
 - b. Other 100 points
 - c. Event lasting more than one day
 - i. 200 points
 - ii. Revenue generating -400 points
- 6. Annual picnic
 - a. Chairman 200 points



Fire Extinguishers -What's the big deal?

So, when's the last time you saw flames erupt at a car show,

right? Other than ones painted on a rod...

Well, in my experience, I'm happy to have had an extinguisher handy when I needed it. A number of years ago, I set out for a local cruise night in my 1963 Imperial. As I maneuvered into a parking space, a soft bang and a loss of much-needed steering boost resulted from the high pressure hose bursting. Hot steering fluid sprayed on a hot exhaust manifold meant flames—and not the painted kind. I suppose I could have run over to the Home Depot and bought an extinguisher and I might have beat the Fire Department to the scene... an extinguisher on the floor by the passenger seat, I was able to quickly douse the flames with minimal collateral damage. I drove the car home and did not make the 10 o'clock news.

At a meet in Nebraska, while a steam car was being fired up, some leaking gas caught fire. Not big conflagration, but nearby extinguishers kept a disaster at bay. So, another good reason to have a fully charged fire extinguisher at the ready is to keep someone else's problem from spreading to your car.

I know some like to keep their extinguisher in the trunk, even held in by a bracket. I have a challenge for you. Have a friend time you as you start from the driver's seat, grab the keys, run around back, open the trunk and free the



fire extinguisher from its bracket and then head back up front to where the problem is. Compare that to reaching under the seat to grab the extinguisher. The cost of a five pound fire extinguisher is nothing compared to the damage that can be prevented when it's available to put to use immediately.

So, you have one for the kitchen, on the way to the basement and one or more hanging in the garage, right?



<u>From the Editor's Desk</u> <u>The Road Map</u>

Thank you to our Participation Points Chairman Vince DeLisi and his "revamp" committee,

who recently reviewed our Participation Points program and made recommendations for changes to the program to make it fairer than it was, and to the membership for voting to accept this committee's recommendations!

I'm sure all are aware that the Road Map Editor benefitted by this update. Therefore, I think it may be time to "pass the baton."

For the last over four years I published the Road Map for no participation points and I still managed to win the participation points trophy one of those years. Since the editor now receives points for his efforts, I'm hoping it will be easier to "sell" the job.

Actually, the Road Map is so much work that I believe it should be broken down into 'divisions' to distribute the work. For instance;

- One person could handle the work, looking at tis issue, up to "Past Events" on page 15.
- Another could put together the "Past Events" section, (again looking at this issue) From page 15 up to page 28.

- Another could handle "The Market Place" by following up with members to acquire pictures of what they have for sale and making sure everything available is included.
- Someone could also be the "Advertising Director" to sell ads, to keep track of the ads placed in the publication, send out annual billing and coordinate with the Treasurer regarding payment.
- Distribution. When I took over the Road Map from Chris Werndley, it was supposed to be an electronic publication only. That didn't last one month, and distribution of the hard copies is very time consuming. Once the publication is complete, it must be taken to the printer, approved for production and later picked up from the printer. Then it has to be prepared for mailing and taken to the post office to be mailed. Our wonderful US Postal Service loses an average of one copy every two months. This means doing it all over again for one copy. In addition, reimbursement slips must be completed and sent to our Treasurer (I am currently about 5 months behind on this!).

The above are just suggestions as to how to split up 500 Participation Points and relieve some of the burden of producing a monthly publication, although one person should be "in charge."

Whoever would like to volunteer for this work, with the exception of Distribution, must be computer savvy.

Or perhaps, there is someone out there who would love to handle the entire job and walk away with 500 Participation Points.

At any rate, I took over this publication after Doris Werndly passed away and Chris begged

for months to pass it on, until he set a date certain to resign and no one volunteered, resulting in the fact that there was no Road Map published for August 2013. It's quite a story as to how I wound up with it to produce the September 2013 issue, my first. But I'll leave it to "I felt like I was walking down a street in Tia Juana, Mexico and I glanced at a vendor's product" and he followed me for blocks until I relented and bought it!

Since that time, I have been awarded with 2 AACA National Master Editor Awards at AACA Annual meetings in Philadelphia and the very prestigious "The Ann S. Eady Memorial Award" which is presented annually at the AACA Annual Meeting in Philadelphia to an "Editor of a region or chapter newsletter for their contribution to the general welfare and spirit of the Antique Automobile Club of America. Presented by the Southeastern Region of AACA, the trophy itself is Ann S. Eady's typewriter which she used as editor of "Peachtree Parade" from 1965 to 1974."

An editor can only win this award once. I can never win it again. (However, rather unusual is that the New Jersey Region has had two winners. Doris Werndley won it in 1993!)

There are only two regions in AACA that have ever won this award three times and five, including the NJ Region, that have ever won it twice. It would be great for the NJ Region to become the third three-time winner!

It's time to "pass the baton" and give another New Jersey Region member the opportunity to win the Ann S, Eady Award.






