From the 2015 NJ Region AACA Constitution & By-Laws

ARTICLE V: MEETINGS

Section 1. The Region shall hold an Annual Meeting and Banquet during the month of December or January on such date thereof, time and place as the Executive Committee shall direct. The primary business of this meeting shall be the installation of Officers, who shall take up their duties at the end of the January





meeting, the awarding of any Annual Trophies and the year-end reports of Officers and Committees. Additional pertinent business may also be handled.

Section 2. A regular meeting of this Region shall be held once a month at a time and place as the executive committee may designate; exception may be made as per Section 4 of this Article,

Section 3. When a regular or special meeting is called the President or Secretary shall notify all members at least five days prior to the meeting.

Section 4. Excepting the November (Election Meeting) meeting, any one succeeding meeting (regular) of this Region may be dispensed with by a three-fourths vote of the members at the preceding meeting, excepting, the July and August meeting, together, may be dispensed with in like manner.

Section 5. Regular Region Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order insofar as possible.





The 9:30 start from the Readington Diner left on time with about 20 cars on our way to Bethlehem, PA. The route sheets were spoton, directions were clear and the roads and scenery were beautiful. Our guide explained how the silk industry moved to Pennsylvania from New Jersey and how women and children worked long hours in the plants (no child labor laws in PA) as well as how machinery was produced for steel, iron and propane industries.

Bill didn't forget we like to eat and there were several great eating places in the area – we enjoyed a nearby restaurant that was once a bank, restored into a bar & bistro. To sum it up if Bill Pritchett says follow me, it's a surprise, follow him, you will have a good time. Thanks Bill & Bette.
