



I ended my February presidents message with how great it is to


be associated with such a fine group of people. I would like to pick up there and continue with that thought.

697th Region Meeting February 2, 2017

The 697th Region Meeting was called to order at

precisely 8:00 p.m.

All were asked to rise for recital of the Pledge of Allegiance

The following guests were welcomed: Bob Brody, Sudhaker "Suds" Reddy

Motion to approve the minutes of the 696th Region Meeting (As printed in the Road Map) was made, approved, seconded. The minutes for the previous meeting will stand as presented in *The Road Map*

<u>Correspondence</u> President Wayne Tuck read a letter sent to Ralph Marano, thanking him for his hospitality. **Abe Platt** had arranged a tour of Mr. Marano's collection in January. Persons attending were treated so well, **President Tuck** felt compelled to send a "thank you" note

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>, was given by <u>Tim</u> <u>Schimmel</u>, A motion to approve Tim's report as presented was unanimously approved.

<u>President's Report</u>: **-Wayne Tuck** Our new president brings a new level of information to our region. **President Tuck** told us of the workings of 50th anniversary pins and mentioned that **William Young** (55 year member, who joined our region in 1955) would be presented with his pin in the near future; **William O'Neill** will receive his pin via USPS.

President Tuck briefly briefed all members present about our recent Board of Directors meeting. Clarifying Ed Geller's position as Vice President of Administration, this is necessary as Mr. Geller deals with government issues for the club. Our

Welcoming Committee, unfortunately, dwindled due to attrition. Newly appointed are Ray & Judy Fischer. Added to our welcoming package will be a descriptive brochure. From 2016. Tim Schimmel was advised to update his accounting system, per our auditor P.J. Ehmann. Tim had purchased a lap-top computer and equipped it with "Quick Books". **Tim** also contracted a post office box for us, giving the club a permanent address. Website will be receiving an update. Webmaster Bill Pritchett will be investigating a new look for our website and will be putting the finishing tours on the 2017 Spring Fling. After years of pleading, **Properties Chair Rich** Reina will have help in inventorying club properties. Present Tuck, Ray Fischer and VP Peck will review what we have, decided what is needed and what should be discarded. At the end of this work, our properties will be inventoried for future convenience. It should be noted that future AACA donations from our Region will be split between the AACA and the AACA Library/building fund.

President Tuck gave us an informative and thoughtful dissertation concerning the current controversy between the Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA) and the Antique Automobile Club of America Museum (AACA Museum). Highlights consist of these points:

- The AACA Museum was created by the AACA Board.
- The AACA Museum was split from the AACA because, at the time, the AACA did not have 501c3 status, a situation that has since been rectified.
- 3) The AACA Library had already merged with the AACA
- 4) The AACA was offered property to build, but not own by the AACA Museum (Building is necessary for the AACA

- since its Library and Headquarters have outgrown their present structure)
- 5) Recent merger proposals between the AACA and the AACA Museum have been rejected as they do not represent an equitable position for both institutions
- AACA Museum advises no new negotiations at this time
- 7) AACA Museum refused to deal with a mediator
- 8) Two AACA past presidents who are also AACA Museum board members we not able to restart negotiations. AACA board member Tom Cox was voted off the Museum board due to disagreements.
- 9) The AACA Museum board is appointed, not elected. It should be noted that the AACA Museum board, formerly made up exclusively of AACA past presidents, now has other dignitaries on its board.
- 10) The AACA Museum continues to be uncooperative in negotiations.

Region activities: **Jerry Peck. VP Peck** informs us there is not a lot of activity this time of year, but reviewed events for the next three months. For everyone's convenience all Region and National events appear in *The Road Map*.



From the 2015 NJ Region AACA Constitution & By-Laws

ARTICLE VII: DUES

Section 1. Dues shall be as recommended to the membership by the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors. Any dues increase shall be approved by the Membership at a regularly scheduled business meeting.

Section 2. The annual dues shall be payable within thirty (30) days after the first day of the Region fiscal year which shall coincide with that of the National A.A.C.A. and is normally January 1st.

Section 3. A member, whose dues lapse over sixty (60) days, in the Region or in the National A.A.C.A., shall be automatically suspended.

A New Member's First Year with the NJ Region AACA

My story begins in January 1988 when my wife Ann and I took her 1982 Mercury Zephyr Z-7 coupe to Marino's, our local Lincoln-Mercury dealer, for routine service. While there we walked into the showroom to speak to Joe, the salesman who sold us the Zephyr in late 1981/early 1982. While we were chatting, Ann noticed a 1988 Cougar sitting on the showroom floor and admired it very much. After a long discussion and several pointed questions on available options and delivery time on a new Cougar, we were told that Ann's Zephyr was ready, so we said our goodbyes and left with a copy of the sales brochure, which we still have. Over the next several days, the conversation at home kept returning to the Cougar we had seen on the showroom floor. In early February we returned to Marino's and ordered a Twilight Blue 3.8 L Cougar LS Special Edition (gold trim package with luggage rack and equalizer stereo radio/cassette player combination) with shadow blue interior. We took position of this absolutely beautiful car in March 1988.

The Cougar was Ann's daily driver going to work, going shopping, visiting family and friends, and going on errands for 12 years before it earned a well deserved rest from daily drudgery and became our weekend pleasure driver. Our Cougar performed its duty as a pleasure driver quite well for the next 15 years and still does so to the present. However, in late 2015, I decided that the Cougar was too nice to just leave in the driveway and only be driven occasionally. This decision came after spending a lot of my free time, since retirement in 2014, at numerous antique automobile shows, antique truck shows, at historical reenactments, and at museums in NJ and PA, as well as at many local cruise nights admiring the stock, restored, and modified old timers being shown off by their proud owners.

So, near the end of 2015, I decided to join the Cougar Club of America (CCOA) and look for a local Cougar club. Finding the Cougar Club of NJ & PA (CCNJPA) listed, I also joined the CCNJPA. At the same time I joined the AACA and subsequently selected the closest AACA regional club. Since I also enjoy antique trucks, I joined the Antique Truck Club of America (ATCA) at the same time. Joining these five organizations provided me with much interesting reading material and more importantly schedules of events so that I could plan out my weekends in 2016.

In December 2015, Ann and I joined CCNJPA members at their Annual Holiday Party, which turned out to be a beautiful day, so several of us drove our Cougars, five in all. The other four Cougars were "pony cars" (1967 thru 1973). Ann's 1988 is a sixth generation car classified as a "personal luxury car" (1974 thru 1997). Having previously owned a white 1978 Cougar with a 351 cid V-8, I can vouch for the "personal luxury car" classification. We had a very nice time and went home thinking this was





a good start. I came to my first NJ Region AACA meeting in February 2016, liked what I saw and was impressed with the proceedings. I returned for the March 2016 meeting and was accepted by the membership present.

During those two months, I put together a list of events that we could bring our Cougar to. Some were on the CCNJPA's calendar of events, some were on the NJ Region AACA's calendar of events, and some were researched on the internet. Our Cougar did well before the judges at the car shows capturing four trophies, one for best un-restored member's car at the NJ Region AACA's annual antique car meet, two for first place in judged class completion for 1980 through 1991, and a third place, also in judged class completion.



It has received the AACA Historic Preservation of Original Features (HPOF) certification 7 times. 


