In some cases, even a few months before the event. Permission to run our meet at Mennen had to be arranged, including insurance and having a police presence. to be identified. All money had to be collected and accounted for and all expenses are promptly paid. Our audio requirements were great and required much time for set up and break down. 

ew would understand why a sixteen year old would buy a seven year old Pontiac Bonneville, nor would the buyer. Yet, it happened.

I ran paper routes and worked in a grocery store to save money to buy my first car. My father agreed to co-sign, for the small loan that'd be necessary, then he brought me to a local Chevrolet dealer.

It was there where I was to first meet the car that would forever give me warm thoughts of youth, enjoyment and liberation.

When I'd first observed Bonney, she was one of the most beautiful things that I'd ever seen. She was black and her body was offset with a white top. She had miles of chrome, both inside and out. She was large, but not for the time and, most importantly, she became mine.

In the three years that I owned her, I took her to the beach, on many dates and, of course, the drive -in with my girlfriend, or with my friends. We cruised the drag, in Brockton, Massachusetts, on Friday and Saturday nights. Main Street was two miles long, with five traffic lights that gave ample opportunities to hail young girls that were going in the opposite direction. We failed to pick up girls, in this manner, on a consistent basis, but nevertheless, it was all pure joy.

With college beckoning, I reluctantly sold my Pontiac to a friend, who'd always wanted to own it. I was content that it'd have a happy home. You know, I think that part of my youth was sold, along with the car, for a mere \$850.00, yet those memories were some of the most impactful of my life and I embraced them for the many years that followed. So began a very long, unconscious vigil that was to last thirty seven years.

In 2005, as I was driving by a Subaru dealership, I saw her. She was featured in front of several other, used cars close to the road. I stopped to take a look. She was big and she was black. I stared at the graceful features of her grill, her enormous chrome bumpers and the attractive, familiar dials on her dashboard. With two children to raise, I sighed and reluctantly went home. A few days later, I came back. Then again and again. On my fifth visit, I lured my unsuspecting wife there, who said very simply, "Aren't you going to buy it"? And so we did!

After the entire family had our first ride together, I told

everyone that we needed to decide what we were going to request on Bonney's antique license plates. We agreed that Bonney was large, spacious and comfortable and it seemed to float in air like a carpet, despite any bump in the road. We submitted our three choice to the NJ DMV.

Just a few days later, an enthusiastic person from the Trenton DMV said the she wanted to make a special phone call to me. I sensed that it seemed important to her as well. She wanted me to know that I'd received my first choice... "EZRYDR".

At that moment, my new, yet familiar, lovefest was reborn.








67th Region Spring Meet at The Mennen Arena



May 10-12, 2018

The AACA Central Spring Meet was

held on May 10-12, 2018, at Auburn Auction Park in Auburn IN. AACA was joined in their hosting duties by RM Auctions and the Nash Motor Club. Combining the show with an on-site auction (RM planned to run 500 cars across the block) provided plenty of opportunity to both see and even purchase some classy cars.

The Auburn area is also home to the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum, the National Automotive and Truck Museum, and the Early Ford V-8 Museum, so car guys and gals have plenty to do in the area in addition to the flea market, car corral, judged show, and auction at the Park.

The NJ Region was amply represented by Art Briggs, Anthony Cecala, Pete Cullen, Ray Fischer, Dave Kantes, Dick Payne, Wayne Tuck, and

Brenda Zimmerman, with Anthony, Brenda, Dave and Pete all serving as judges.

While the weather could have been more cooperative, the rain didn't deter the owners of about 265 vehicles from displaying their cars. The meet's brochure made the point that attendees wanted a less formal and shorter awards evening, so the sitdown dinner was abolished in favor of a lateafternoon BBQ, with show awards presented immediately after dessert.

Report on the NB Center for American Automotive Heritage

April 23rd, 2018 Chair:.....Abraham Platt

On Monday, April 23, 2018 members of the NJ AACA met for breakfast at the Readington Dinner in

Bridge (aka the Free Bridge) into Easton, PA then through Bethlehem and finally through Allentown to the NB Center. We re-assembled adjacent to the NB Center.

We were lead into the facility by Keith Flickinger, the Curator for this facility, driving a 1933 Marmon V16 Victoria Coupe. The first time I saw this

beautiful automobile was at the Concours D'Elegance Edison held at Thomas Edison's former residence in Llewellyn Park in West Orange in October 2015.

The tour started shortly after 1:00 pm and continued until approximately 5:00 pm. Keith welcomed us into the reception building within the NB Center grounds, provided us with a short narrative and played a short film about Mr. Nicola Bulgari, his love for American automobiles, and his passion for preserving automotive history. The film also showed the buildup to the 50th Anniversary celebration of the Buick Club of America (BCA) on the grounds of this facility culminating with the car show that



Whitehouse Station. An air of excitement was palatable as we started our Road Trip to The NB Center for American Automotive Heritage facility in Allentown, PA. The planned route took us through the New Jersey countryside proceeding from Whitehouse Station through Potterstown, Annandale, Lebanon, Alpha, and Phillipsburg crossing the Hamilton Street



was open to the general public on July 30, 2016.

The tour was well attended by 66 members of the NJ Region with friends and family from the South Jersey and Gettysburg Regions and other car clubs.

The NB Center houses *Mr. Bulgari's* extensive collection of vintage automobiles, especially American marquees, in this 27-acre facility. The collection consists of 155 cars from the 1920's through the 1970's which are housed in several buildings on the grounds of the former *Boulevard* Drive-in Theater.

The drive-in was active from 1949 through 1985. Four of the buildings house restoration and maintenance shops and several buildings house the car collection.

was in town. Other buildings housed the upholstery shop, and the mechanical/maintenance shop.
