

read a recent article about rubber tires that were made, in the earlier part of the 1900's that gleaned my interest. I thought I might share it with you.

I expect that many of you are already aware that rubber tires, in the early part of the 1900's were white, owing to the natural color of rubber. The theory goes (which remains just that) that there was a lack of zinc oxide to manufacture war-related ammunition. An alternative to zinc oxide was needed to be found and a superior replacement was identified.

It was a substance that was made from super fine particles of what came to be known as *carbon black*. When it was added to rubber, it turned the tires, especially of the now-famous Model T, from white to black. It not only increased the wear resistance of this "hybrid" tire ten times, but it also provided ultraviolet protection, which minimized the potential of cracking.

All tires today contain between twenty five to thirty percent of carbon black. By adding just one, simple substance, it profoundly influenced tire color, strength, durability, UV resistance and longevity.

In the field of chemistry or biology, if a single element is added in an experiment to cause or speed up a reaction, it's called a catalyst. It can increase a reaction, without being used up itself. A catalyst can also be a condition or event that's the cause of an important change or event.

You're wondering where I'm going with all of this. Let me first say that our wonderful club is growing... and fast. That's the change/event that I'm speaking of. During the months of October and November, we saw the addition of *nineteen* new members to our wonderful club. It didn't just happen, by itself. It happened as a result of a catalyst, which caused many of you to become more active and involved.

The catalyst I'm referring to is *enthusiasm*. Enthusiasm now runs like a red thread, through everything that we are now doing. More members are engaged. They're thinking about new, innovative ideas about how we can make the club better. A standout few have discovered new places to visit, or have chaired new events that we've never done before. 






Fred Trusty HPOF Chairman



have heard some misconceptions lately about the HPOF class so let's take a closer look at the Historical Preservation Original Features Class or as a lot of people call it, The Original Class.

HPOF was created in 1988 to reward and pro-vide incentives to keep vehicles in their original unaltered state and provide a living his-

tory of how factories manufactured these vehicles. They also serve as a record of how these vehicles should be restored. There are two major areas evaluated in HPOF; maintenance and preservation. An HPOF vehicle is one that retains its original components and features not restored or altered. It must be an authentic vehicle as the dealer could have prepared for delivery to the customer with any feature, option, or accessory in factory literature or company directives for the model year of the vehicle. These are the same standards as class judging. With HPOF, if a component serves the pur-

With HPOF, if a component serves the purpose for which it was intended, it's acceptable in most cases. For example, a bumper with some scratches and dings would be fine but one where all the chrome has flaked off and has holes rusted through would not be acceptable. There must be enough of the original vehicle left to be an example to a restorer.

Maintenance—Maintenance items are parts that will eventually have to be replaced if the vehicle is driven. Examples are batteries, belts, brakes, compressors, fuel pumps, hoses, alternators, tires, water pumps, and many other parts. Maintaining a vehicle is vital to its longevity so replacing maintenance items is not only accepted but it is encouraged and will not have a negative effect on the certification of the vehicle. Note that period correct replacements should be used and installed correctly.

Preservation—Many damaged exterior items can be replaced with NOS parts or better examples from salvage with no effect on the certification of the vehicle. Examples include bumpers, hoods, fenders, running boards, trunk lids, and most trim pieces. The same thing goes for many interior items as well. Searching the local salvage yards, swap meets, eBay, Hemmings, or other sources to find a correct replacement might take a while but part of the fun of the old car hobby is the hunt.

This is the first in a series about HPOF. Next time we'll look at some specific areas of vehicles. Remember, they're only original once.



How I ended up with 1939 Ford

was cruising the internet January 2016 looking at Cars like any other red blooded American, and ran across this car. I wasn't even in the market for a classic, but I always wanted something from the late 30s to early 40s. Had to be stock. To me, those years we full of transition both in design and mechanicals. Still not contemplating a purchase, I contacted the owner and said "You need to put up better photos and are you sure that's the price?" His response was "You want to buy it?" Hmmm.

I knew NOTHING about Fords, Chevys, Pontiacs, etc., etc. from this period. I said "Let me take a ride up to see it Saturday". That winter we had 2 crazy mild January weekends with temps in the low 60s and clear blue skies. Went up with a friend who only knew that cars had 4 wheels. I was under and over the car for almost an hour and the owner later told me he thought I was nuts. I said it looked good and said I we'll talk again soon.

The next Friday I was traveling with friends to the Atlantic City Classic Car Show & Auction and received a call from the owner. I didn't want to conduct business while driving so I waited until arriving at the Convention Center. It was so noisy on the floor I ducked into the men's room and called him to say "We're only \$200 apart, so I'll step up". Heck of a place to close a deal!. I Came home and called to say I'll be up this Sunday to pick up the car, how do you want to be paid? "In cash, \$100 bills". Yikes!

Saturday I went to the bank and withdrew the funds in cash. I was sweating bullets as the teller kept screwing up the count and I thought this was a delay because they thought I was going to buy illegal stuff. After 45 minutes they finally wrapped it all and I stuffed the wads into my pockets. Ever feel how much +\$14,000 weighs? I was scared to death someone was watching me and I'd get jumped in the parking lot.

On Sunday another friend and I took his truck and trailer up to Elmwood Park to bring home my 77 year old car. The owner, ever the character, wanted me to do the transaction at the curbside! I grabbed him and said let's go inside to count 140 big ones. We loaded my new old 1939 Ford Fordor Deluxe up and were homebound.

The price was right, the owner was frustrated with knuckle heads trying to get it next to nothing, only drove it 200 miles annually, never went over 45 mph and with 2 weekends in the low 60s under clear blue skies in the middle of winter, it was meant to be.

with a new interior and a rebuilt motor to some extent. My only nod to modernity are radial tires.

The car was purchased in February of 2016 just before it's 77th birthday, it will be 80 in 2019! I've gotten snowed on at the Ralph Moreno Packard extravaganza in January of 2017 and caught in downpour on Rte. 78 where I found all the leaks around the not-so-tight crank -out windshield (ah, those vacuum wipers). No heat, no turn signals, I take it out 12 months a year. When it's hot I have 4 levels of a/c to choose: 1) windows down, 2) rear vent windows open, 3) cowl vent up, and then super a/c...4) windshield cranked all the way out!

So what keeps me going? One of my thrills is continuing to learn to appreciate the limits of 1939 technology. Another is to honor my Dad, a 92 year old Navy man and other WWII relatives, long gone. You'll see little indications here and there around the car. You may have also seen some WWII propaganda posters I display often both representing both home front transportation and military related.

For me, it is truly a hobby in learning and educating about this 1939 car, what was going on in America then and most of all, seeing the smiles on those who come by at car shows and assisted living and veterans events. I wouldn't have as much fun going it alone so thanks to some wonderful folks within AACA-NJ and the EFV8 clubs.



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

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
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
