FEATURED MEMBERS COVER CAR—1962 THUNDERBIRD

eith purchased the 1962 Thunderbird convertible iust about two years ago. He had four twopassenger automobiles but did not have a classic automobile that would contain four passengers and decided that he wanted to include his friends. Keith had storage for only 5 cars, so his wife Brenda asked where they would store a sixth. Since he did not have an answer, (knocking out a

wall in their home to store in the car in the house was not suitable), Keith sold his 1974 Chrome bumper MGB with the rarest color, Black Tulip, which is a beautiful dark purple. Keith always liked the Thunderbirds and had owned two 1957's, which is one of his very favorite cars. He looked at the various 50s and 60s American

convertibles that would hold four passengers and narrowed the search to a 1961-63 Bullet/Rocket Bird.

Keith bought the 1962 Thunderbird Convertible retrofitted with Roadster parts obtainable from the Ford dealer at the time. The only difference between a bom Roadster is a "B" on the Roadster data plate, and no holes punched on Roadster's rear fenders to be able to attach fender skirts. He preferred the colors red, white, rose, and a couple of the others that Ford offered on the Thunderbird. Black was not on the list until he saw an advertisement on the Internet for this beautiful black 1962 convertible. The pictures looked absolutely stunning, being



aware that pictures can sometimes be deceiving and the car was 400 miles from his home, normally he would never buy one sight unseen. Keith phoned the classic car dealer, Harwood Motors, which was in a suburb of Cleveland, Ohio and 400 miles from his New Jersey home. They advised him, and it turned out to be true, that two people were coming to look at the car that evening and three more we're interested and they wouldn't budge on the price as they felt they had under -priced it. Having looked for a Thunderbird for several months he knew it was a good price if the car was as nice as it was described and looked in the pictures. It

would be impossible for him to make the trip in time and Keith was pretty much resigned to not purchasing the car.

Then he remembered that the president of the International Thunderbird Club, Bart, had done something no other national president of any of the several car clubs to which he has belonged: he called Keith and welcomed him into the club, and saying he was from Ohio. Keith called Bart, and it turned out he was 20 or so minutes away from the car! Bart drove over at once, saw the car, and said indeed it was as nice as it looked. With the help of

a credit card, Keith made a down payment and car was his! He later learned that one of the people who had seen the car previously, was waiting on the carbs to be tuned – but had refused to put any money down until he heard it purr and was heartbroken. Keith sympathized, as he had been in those shoes before, and dawdled while a car was swooshed away. So, the bottom line is if it had not been for Bart, Keith would not be featured in this months Roadmap! All of the 1962 Thunderbird convertibles had the venerable 390 motor, power steering, power brakes, 3-speed automatic tranny, power top and swing-away steering wheel.

The latter two are the real attention grabbers. The steering wheel swings to the center of the car to make entry and exit easier. So much, that he finds himself trying to swing the wheel on the familys modern drivers! The real piece of engineering genius is the top, which never fails to draw onlookers. When up, the first operation is the trunk opening up in reverse, as two large screws unscrew the deck and it slowly lifts up in the air and a panel which is hidden flips up. Then the fabric top folds itself down into the trunk. The trunk lid then begins to lower, and the two large screws screw themselves down and you have one long expanse of metal covering the car. If you have



the Roadster tonneau, which makes it look like a two-seater, with the rear seat hidden, it covers that as well. The total operation lasts 45 seconds, and involves multiple hydraulic pumps, electric motors, simple switches and relays. If any of them fail, the top stops in its tracks!

The Blackbird car is equipped with the four items which make a Roadster different from a Convertible: wire wheels, the tonneau cover, front fender emblems, and a grab bar on the dash. In addition, this one has a factory tachometer, power windows and driver's seat, and an ultra-rare period accessory 45 rpm record player. Keith and Brenda thoroughly enjoy the car, having driven it back the 400 miles home without any issues. The car has been invited to, and participated in the 2018 Greenwich, CT Concours d'Elegance. It rides great, compared to any modern car. It also fills up one bay of the garage, being 205 inches long in a 206 ½" inch space. Upon Brenda's suggestion, Keith installed a laser beam on the ceiling of the garage, and now when the dot reaches a certain point, and he no longer has to have her come and look if he is parked correctly!

See Where They Rust: 1958 Alfa Romeo Giulietta Sprint

"See Where They Rust" is a series and category where we feature listings that do a particularly good job displaying where certain models tend to suffer from rust. We love looking for rust-free cars, but we have learned a ton about how to inspect the dry cars from looking at photos of heavily rusted models. Obviously floors and rocker panels are always at risk, but every model has different special areas where they corrode. We hope that this series is informative and helpful when you are verifying the claims of sellers and their "99% rust free" cars. -BaT

This 1958 Alfa Romeo Giulietta Sprint is one of the rustiest we've seen over the years, with rotten rockers, floors, and what's likely to be heavily compromised structural components beneath. The car is missing its windows, interior, trim, and probably several hundred pounds in deteriorated metal, too, but does include a surprisingly decent looking twin cam under the crusty hood. It was listed on eBay in Los Angeles, California for

\$8,950 OBO.



The car is so heavily corroded along the bottom that it's buckled in half aft of the doors, with apparently little more than the roof keeping it from splitting into two halves. Glass, door handles, bumpers, and much more are missing and likely gone forever.





Panning out, the tweaked rear axle doesn't appear to be any better off, and if anything the passenger side door dips lower than the driver's. Note however that it does appear to retain a window, apparently the only intact glass to be found anywhere.



Floors are Swiss cheesed, the steering wheel rim is separating, and most fittings aside from gauges are missing. Even these are likely to be good and crusty inside.



Front seats remain in place, but are just as likely to hide rotten guts as the speedo and tach are.



Underneath its lid, the trunk is little more than a jagged, crusty hole, but that rear axle does appear to be salvageable.



Likewise, the engine seems to be in relatively decent shape, but there's no word on whether it still





Even getting the car on a flatbed would take some very careful planning and maneuvering, but chances are that there has to be at least some parts here that could live on in another, more fortunate example.


