

just experienced one of the most enjoyable, local, antique car shows that I've had, in quite some time. What was most significant was the happy fact that it was in my small boro of Flemington, New Jersey.

With the closing of its famous, local hotel, Flemington's downtown area was no longer a favored attraction. Its antique car show, held every other Saturday, was getting "long in the tooth" because of its sameness, smaller size and the absence of good food and spirits.

It's strange for me to be writing about a past event, which hasn't yet occurred, but I can only be leading up to our Spring National which, at the time of this reading, now lies behind us. Our Spring National had all of these same, essential elements. It was meticulously planned by Wayne Tuck and his many, competent and highly motivated chairpersons. We had a turnout of over four hundred cars and sufficient numbers of people to fulfill our contractual agreement, with the host hotel. Assuming that we merely broke even, our event was a phenomenal success and a credit to all of our region members who participated.





FEATURED COVER CAR: 1973 Alfa Romeo Montreal

his model Alfa came to be because the Italian government asked Alfa Romeo to do something special to put on display in the Italian pavilion at the world's fair in Montreal in 1967. Two prototypes were built and sent to Canada for display. After the fair closed in 1969 the two cars were returned to Alfa Romeo. One of the two concept cars built for Expo 67 is displayed in the Alfa Romeo Historical Museum in Arese, Italy, while the other is in museum storage. Alfa decided to build a road going version for sale to be named after the city that caused its creation. Originally, the concept cars

were displayed without any model name, but the public took to calling it The Montreal

The road cars are powered by a 2.6 liter quad cam, dry sump, fuel injected V8 with a five speed manual gearbox. The chassis and running gear of the production Montreal were taken from the Giulia GTV coupe

with a double wishbone suspension, coil springs and dampers at the front and a live axle with limited slip differential at the rear.

The V8, special body and difficult production line (the basic structure was made at Alfa's Arese factory near Milan, shipped to Bertone's plants around Turin for body fitting, and then back to Arese for assembly) caused the price to be expensive. With a 200hp V8 and less than 3,000 pounds, the Montreal was quick. 0-60 in less than 8 seconds with a top speed of 135 mph. However the V8 was thirsty and needed proper maintenance. The OPEC embargo in 1973 didn't help sales.

Visually the most eye catching feature is the car's front end with four headlamps partly covered by unusual "grilles", that retract when the lights are switched on. Another stylistic ele-

have never seen one. A little over 3900 world-wide and if you go searching the web you'll find that the Montreal has a huge fan base with clubs all over the world. You'll even find a picture of Ed and his car on the Alfa Romeo Montreal owners club Website where just about all of the known cars are linked. Sadly Alfa never offered the Montreal in the United States as the new regulatory paperwork mountain was ramping up.

The interior of the Montreal is deceiving in space but the back seat is for small children. For those of us that love looking at dash-boards, the Montreal is a treat. The tach and speedometer are right there in your face with the secondary gauges arrayed underneath them. A true work of design genius, easy to read and great to look at.

ment is the NACA duct on the bonnet. The duct is not operational since its purpose is not to draw air into the engine, but to visually hide the power bulge in the hood. The slats behind the doors contain the cabin vents, but apart from that only serve cosmetic purposes. The Montreal remains Alfa's only post war regular production V8.

Ed has owned his Montreal since 1981. The car was originally located in Italy and brought in at the request of an Alfa owner who used the same mechanic that Ed did at the time. The intended customer didn't take the car after it arrived. Ed ended up buying the Montreal sometime later. He has had the car repainted once, the seats recovered twice and the engine rebuilt once. The Montreal currently has 272,000 kilometers on it.

The Montreal is rare enough that most of us


