Vice President for National Activities, I posted a question online in the AACA Forum asking where members would like to see the club hold future AACA Nationals provided me a suggestion of where they'd like to see and Tours. I also had an article in the Winter 2019 is- our club hold a future show or tour. (And keep those sue of the AACA Rummage Box asking the same suggestions coming!) question. I'm happy to report that I received a number of great suggestions from members, and thank each of have stepped forward to host a show or tour. And for them for their input.

host future AACA national shows and tours, and I'm event and will not let you fail. C'mon-what are you equally happy to report that a number of them contact- waiting for? ed me for more information about hosting a national

activity and several submitted applications to host a show or tour in 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024. Two other regions said they are going to submit applications to host (one to host a Nationals in 2021 and the other a Nationals in 2022). I thank each of these regions—we can't hold shows or tours without regions stepping forward to host them.

While the 2020 National Activities Calendar is complete (although we may be adding another tour), the 2021 calendar is only half full and the 2022-2025 calendars each only have 1-2 activities on them now besides the cornerstones of our national calendar: the Southeastern Spring Nationals in Charlotte, NC; the Central Spring Nationals in Auburn, IN; and the Eastern Fall Nationals in Hershey, PA. In particular we need hosts for the 2023 and 2025 Grand Nationals (in either the Central or Western Divisions): the Glidden Tour in 2021, 2023, and 2025; and the Reliability Tour in 2022 and 2024. (Everyone loves Brass Era vehicles, and I keep being told how passionate our Brass Era enthusiasts are—and that I will be pilloried if there isn't a Reliability Tour on the calendar—yet finding a region to host a Reliability Tour is like searching for gold at those roadside "pan for gold" tourist traps.) We also need regions in the Western Division to step forward to host an AACA Nationals or Tour. Based on the comments I received online, via e-mail, and in person, our members want to visit and participate in AACA national activities in the west, southwest, Pacific northwest, and Rocky Mountains areas. (When I was in the Air Force, I was assigned in these areas. I know how beautiful they are, and understand why members want to visit them.) AACA members enjoy participating in our club's national activities wherever they're held, but I've received many comments about the dearth of national activities in the Western Division. This year we're holding the Western Fall Nationals in Fallbrook, CA (November 6-9), and next year the 2020 Western Spring Nationals (April 23-25, 2020) and the Founders Tour in Show Low, AZ (April 26 - May 1, 2020), but we have nothing scheduled yet in the Western Division for 2021-2025. Calling all Western Division regions and After being appointed as this year's chapters: we need you! To paraphrase the movie Field of Dreams, "If you hold it, members will come."

#### Activity Report NJ Region Summer Tour - NY Finger Lakes Area

e were able to muster up 10 member families to resurrect the NJ Region Summer Tour for the first time in 4 years! The group consisted of 19 people travelling in seven classic cars and two modern vehicles, and over the four day tour, we managed to schedule 7 official stops, travelling a distance of about 650 miles from the opening breakfast diner and back to the NJ state line at the Delaware Water Gap.

Bill selected a great host hotel for us, a Hampton Inn that is ranked #4 in the country, and they proved to us how they earned that

title! Each day started with quite rooms, a great breakfast, nice lobby, safe parking, and a convenient location, plus there was a brew pub in the adjacent property. Preliminary plans are to revisit this location for the 2020 Region Summer tour!

Here is a rundown of the daily activities:

Day #1 – Most of the tourists met at the Mt. Bethel Diner in PA, enjoyed a filling breakfast, then departed along scenic section of PA Route 611 and a quick photo op near the Delaware Water Gap park. From there we stayed on highways to Scranton for the first stop at the Everhart Museum in Nay Aug Park, featuring 'nature, science and art' exhibits. Of course





we found a lunch stop, with decent pizza and sandwiches before heading north to Sayre, PA, where we all checked in to the hotel for the three night stay.

Day #2 – After a leisurely breakfast, we all headed up to Norwich NY to visit the Northeast Classic Auto Museum, to view the hundreds of vehicles on display. They had everything from 1900 to 1990s, lots of brass, chrome, vinyl and steel. They even had a Gremlin, a Pacer and a Vista Cruiser in one section past the Duesenbergs and Auburns! Of course, we had to make another lunch stop, with the group breaking up going to two restaurants, before the 1 ½ hour ride over some very interesting country roads to our 3rd stop at Cornell University Botanical Gardens in Ithica NY. We saw lots of





beautiful flower gardens, walked around the campus' lake, and admired waterfalls, gorges, and some sculptures at their arboretum. Back to the hotel to, um, eat!

**Day #3** – I didn't mention how **HOT** the weather was on Day 1 or 2, did I? With a 'feels like' over 100 degrees, most of us used our A/C to manage the extremes, and there was one couple travelling old school. Well, back to today's trek – on a rainy day, ALL day! That didn't dampen adventurous spirits at Stop #4, the



Glenn Curtiss Museum in Hammondsport NY. We had a great guide who shared almost two hours of his time, making the visit very educational. In addition to planes, there were many period cars on display, about a half dozen of which were on loan from a NJ collector from Blairstown. After the planes, we drove about a half hour up and over the mountain ridge separating Keuka Lake from Seneca Lake, with a peak elevation of 1,800 feet! Even with the clouds, there were a few great views of the lake! We pulled into Watkins Glen to find our 2pm boat tour, Stop #5, was delayed due to weather, so... we ate! Seneca Harbor has a few great restaurants, and we enjoyed at least two of them! We did get the one-hour boat





ride in, with a young narrator who did a nice job of sharing local history about the lake. Then it was back to the hotel, to, um, eat again!

Day #4 – One more leisurely hotel breakfast, then pack the cars and checkout, with beautiful weather for travelling. Stop #6 was just across town. Sayre Historical society has a very proud museum, in a beautifully restored passenger rail station with a local caboose on site. Upon finishing our tour, we began the ride south. To break up the 3-4 hour ride, I arranged for Stop #7, a tour of the Catlin House Museum, on the University of Scranton campus, but not before a hastily arranged group lunch at the Lackawanna Train Station restaurant. The original lunch stop was to be an Irish pub across the street, but who knew

they would be closed on weekdays when college is on break? We learned some interesting facts about Scranton's history, and may work on a few more landmark stops for next year's Region Tour.



eptembers cover car was an easy choice. The Crown Victorias were lower and longer than any fixed roof cars that Ford had ever produced, and they made sure that loyal Ford customers had a full luxury option from the Blue Oval. Certainly one of the most attractive and rare post-war Fords.

This tropical rose and snowshoe white Crown Vic has been in Donna's family for twenty five years, and was purchased from the original owner by Donna's brother, Robert. The car sat idle in a garage for several years prior

to Roberts passing. Wanting to keep the car in the family, Donna's nieces gave her the Crown Victoria. To

make the Crown Vic a reliable car, many original components had to be rebuilt or replaced. The addition of power steering was a pleasure, along with front disc brakes and a twelve volt electrical system. With 70,000 miles and the original engine and transmission the car can still do 0-60 in 11 seconds. Other than minor upgrades, the Vic is considered stock. It's a comfortable ride that goes along smoothly at 65 miles an hour, and has won several trophies at local car shows.

The American Ford line of cars gained a new body for 1955 to keep up with the competition and the new Y-



block V8 was now offered in two sizes: Standard Fords used a 272 CID (4.5 L) version with 162 hp (121 kW) with 2-barrel carburetor and single exhaust or 182 hp with 4-barrel carburetor and dual exhaust. dle" across the hardtop roof, which originally appeared on the Mercury XM-800 concept car. This use of a styl-

ing feature to visually separate the front of the passenger compartment from the rear reappeared on the 1977-1979 Ford Thunderbird, the Ford Fairmont Futura and Mercury Zephyr Z-7 coupes. The Fairlane Crown Victoria was also offered with a transparent "skylighted" top. New brakes were also introduced using 11-inch drums. The Fords had a new frame, but continued with five cross members to maintain the comfort ride. In 1955, for the first time, Ford offered seat belts as a dealer installed option.

The 1955 Fords were marketed under separate names for each of the three trim levels: Ford Mainline, Ford Customline and Ford Fairlane. 1955 was



a great year to be shopping for your first new car. Ford, whose overhead-valve V-8 was now in its second year, sported many advanced styling themes, with a deliberately strong association to the new Thunderbird. The top



of the line Crown Victoria, new for 1955 and sporting a new wrap-around wind-shield, tubeless tires, disc wheel covers and tons of new options, was one of the icons of the "2 tone paint and chrome" era, sporting a unique chrome-pillar roofline, and in the case of Donna's car presented here, the factory correct two-tone color scheme both inside and out.

Keeping an automotive piece of history is a labor of love and it's best done as a family to preserve the rich

history. Donna's great nephew, Alex, just graduated from college in May, and he will now take ownership of his grandfather's Crown Victoria so that the car will ever remain in the family.

#### RICH'S REPAIR RAMBLINGS SEPTEMBER 2019

n the initial installment of this column, found in the Aug. 2019 Road Map, we listed the basic hand tools you should have for maintenance and repair work on your classic car. This month, we'll add the automotive-specific tools and equipment you'll need, plus our recommended shop supplies and consumables which should be in any automotive workshop. (Additional carspecific tools will be covered when we feature certain repairs, for example, brake tools for brake work.)



3.5 ton jack is overkill for my 2,000 lb Alfa. These jack stands have locking pins for added safety.

#### **AUTOMOTIVE-SPECIFIC TOOLS & EQUIPMENT**

Lifting: Performing the most basic repairs, such as oil changes and front end work, requires lifting the car. So let's make this point early: YOUR SAFETY, MEAN-ING PREVENTION OF INJURY OR DEATH, DEPENDS ON SAFELY LIFTING A CAR. Never, ever, use the factory jack for anything but changing a tire in an emergency. And never, ever, get under a car supported by just a floor jack, or heavens, by milk crates or cinder blocks. Get a good floor jack, and one or two pair of jack stands. The floor jack weight rating should equal or exceed the weight of the entire car (for example, use a 2-ton jack to lift a corner of a 4,000-lb. car). Make sure the jack stands are low enough to get under your car, and high enough to raise the car to your desired working height. Use the jack stands every time you raise and work on the car. I have a floor jack and three sets of jack stands (different heights for different cars), plus a set of drive-on ramps, convenient for oil changes since wheel removal isn't necessary.

Oil Change: You can do an oil change without these, but a dedicated oil drain bucket (low profile, with at least a 6 qt. capacity), a selection of funnels, and an oil filter wrench that fits your car's filter will make the job easier and neater.

Electrical Work: You don't do electrical work? I'm SUPPLIES hoping you will see how easy this can be. For wiring repair, start with a wiring cutting/stripping/crimping tool. Basic circuit checks can be made with a test light, but

better still, consider investing in a digital multimeter (DMM).; I bought mine for under \$50. Also handy is a terminal release tool to disengage terminals from multiplugs.

Ignition: Our old jalopies use ignition points, condenser, cap, rotor, spark plugs, and plug wires. To do the job right, you need a dwell meter, timing light, and

plug gapper. Spark plug sockets are worth it: internal foam protects the ceramic and grips the plug upon removal (there are two sizes, so check whether your plugs are 5/8" or 13/16"). Spark plug wire pliers are nice to have; they help remove stubborn wires.

It's a major annoyance when I want to start a job on a weekend only to discover that I'm missing some "supply"

that requires me to drive back and forth to the store, when it's a \$10 item I really should have on hand, firm. Whether you're just starting out, or looking to replenish, sumables in your storage cabinet.

Chemicals: Here are the "essential seven" that I couldn't work without:

- Spray lube: WD-40 is most folks' go-to lube, handy whenever you need to unstick something. Most of it evaporates, which is usually an advantage. If you need something heavier, white lithium grease in a spray or tube works well.
- Rust-buster: Sooner or later, you'll need help loosening a fitting that's rusted tight. My dad used Liquid Wrench, and so do I, although lately I've been fond of B'laster spray. Your local store shelves have lots of

choices.

Thread locker: Some automotive fittings rely on more than mechanical tightening; they need chemical

help too. Thread locker liquid hardens and prevents fasteners from loosening due to vibration.

- Glue: Glue fixes objects which are NLA (no longer available), and on our old buggies. Again, dad was using two-part epoxy back in the 1970s, and I've made repairs with it that are still holding 40 years later. Other automotive choices include rubber cement, contact cement, and weatherstrip adhesive.
- Cleaner/degreaser: Dirty car parts need to be clean upon reassembly. A waterless solution, is spray brake cleaner. Be aware that you'll go through a can in about 5 minutes. If it's OK to get the part wet, Simple Green works well. Your local hardware store has a variety of grease-cutters.
- Gasket maker: Gasketing material in a tube is a life-saver when working on old cars. Many gaskets are NLA; even with a gasket, gasket makers can act as an additional sealant. We don't want leaks! RTV (room temperature vulcanizing) dries semi-hard; I'm partial to the stuff that stays sticky and doesn't get completely
- Petroleum jelly/dielectric grease: Great for it's a best practice to have a variety of supplies and con- battery terminals, I use this on electrical connections on my old Italian car to chase away those electrical gremlins. British car owners should buy it by the gallon.

Electrical: A roll of black electrical tape, some 14gauge black wire (the smaller the number, the thicker the wire), and crimp-on terminals will get you started with electrical repairs.

General Shop Supplies: A fire extinguisher, eye protection, and a first-aid kit can literally be lifesavers. Gloves, paper towels, rags, and hand cleaner all help keep the mess at bay.






