ust what is the Driver Participation Class (DPC)? It is unlike any other class in the AACA Judging system. The vehicles may be restored or not. They may be a work in progress or just your touring vehicle. It can be your retired show

vehicle as well. Your vehicle can have safety and convenience upgrades performed to them. They are not point judged but visually evaluated.

Like I stated in my last AA magazine article, "Participation, Retired, Recognition, Alternative, Support and Rewarding, these are a few words that explain what DPC offers AACA members." This statement still applies.

Does your vehicle (car, truck, motorcycle, motorbike or motor scooter) qualify for DPC evaluation? As stated in the AACA Official Judging Guidelines in Section 4, pages 4-5 and 4-6: The vehicle must be 25 years or older, must be roadworthy and should be able to pass a state safety inspection. The exterior, interior, chassis and engine components must AP-PEAR period correct per the original manufacturer. But as stated above, your vehicle may have safety and/or convenience upgrades performed.

What are these upgrades? Seat belts, seat coverings, turn signals, added stop lights, sealed beam/halogen headlights, radial tires, alloy wheels of the same era and/or same vehicle manufacturer, radio upgrades, electrical upgrades, brake upgrades (bolt on), steering upgrades (bolt on), air conditioning, overdrive system (manual or automatic) and altered exhaust. We have found that these upgrades are what most members perform on their Driver for safety and convenience to be able to drive and/or tour on today's roads and highways.

In 2000, the AACA National Board wanted to increase attendance at National Meets (Nationals). The percentage of AACA members that own and drive DPC type vehicles is far greater than the owner percentage of restored show cars and/or all original vehicles. The National Board also wanted these AACA members to be able to drive around with their Driver vehicle displaying the AACA DPC grille badge for all to see and admire.

As stated earlier, DPC vehicles are visually evaluated and not point judged. This is performed generally by a two-member DPC evaluation team. The DPC evaluation form that you receive at the show field has a shaded area on the front that asks you some questions about your vehicle that must be answered. In the bottom right corner we ask for your signature. On the back of the evaluation form it lists accepted upgrades that we allow. Also, please note on the form it is stated that your trunk lid does not have to be open. We feel that as a Driver you could have your luggage, etc., in there if you stayed overnight for the show and we don't want you to have to place these items out on the ground.

At the Awards Banquet, if your DPC vehicle is certified for the first time you will receive a DPC board, a DPC chip, a DPC grille badge and a congratulations card. The grille badge should be visually mounted on the vehicle. No vehicle will be recertified if it does not display the DPC badge. When you show your vehicle again in DPC to have it recertified, you will receive another DPC chip to mount onto your DPC board and another congratulations card.

There are two National Awards given to two DPC recertified vehicles each year at the Annual Convention in Philadelphia. One is for a prewar model and one for a postwar model.

See the AACA Official Judging Guidelines for further details or attend one of the Continuing Judges Education (CJE) programs presented at all Nationals, except the Grand National, and also given at the Philadelphia Convention. These are conducted by myself and/or the Assistant Chairman of DPC, John Flechler.

Again, in 2000 the National Board's goal was to increase attendance at Nationals by allowing members to display their DPC Vehicles and be rewarded for doing so. When you do so, you are supporting the host Region and the AACA as a whole. I feel you will find the camaraderie at a National to be to your liking. I personally feel that DPC should be the largest class at all Nationals.

So, get a family member involved and let's see 'the other car' in your garage, even if it may not be quite ready for prime time! And look for the article elsewhere in the Road Map promoting the award sponsorship opportunities available.

And while we're still about three months away from the show, let me remind everyone that volunteers are needed for everything from the registration table to parking to judging and manning the Regions' membership tables. A sign-up sheet will be circulated at the February meeting so the planning committee can make staffing plans. In the meantime, you have twelve weeks to get your cars ready for a great event!



Anniversary Cougar as a commemorative edition. All badging on the exterior of the 20th Anniversary Cougar as well as on this 1988 Special Edition Gold (front bumper, grille trim, trunk lid nomenclature, and molding trim) were trimmed in actual 24K gold, and the special C-pillar emblems were gold cloisonné. 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Rich's Repair Ramblings, **April 2020: Repairing The Ground**

ast month's lesson was "the number one cause of automotive electrical problems is loose, dirty, or corroded connections". This ■ month we'll show you how to fix them. On our AACA cars, many electrical terminals are universal, or a standardized size; they have self-described names like ring, spade, blade, and bullet. Making a repair typically involves replacing a short piece of wire, or attaching a new connector to a wire, or both.

The best way to make such a repair is by soldering. However, soldering requires dedicated tools and equipment, and some practice. An alternate method is using solderless terminals, aka crimp terminals, which are quicker and easier than soldering. I've been successfully using them for years. They get a bad rap as unreliable, but like most repairs, there's a correct way, and an incorrect way, to complete the job. Let's dive

First, you'll need these tools and supplies: wire stripper, terminal crimper, wire, appropriate terminal, and electric tape or shrink wrap. There are some very fancy stripping and crimping tools on the market, but I've had the same pair of yellow-handled combo cutters/ strippers/crimpers forever, and they still get the job done. For wire, you'll want the same gauge as the existing wire (gauge number DECREASES as wire thickness increases- if in doubt, bring a sample to the store). For most of my car repairs, 16- or 14-gauge suffices.

and the largest, yellow (10-12 gauge). Again, for cars, COPPER IS NOT UNDER THE TERMINAL BARREL.

blue connectors cover almost all my needs. When buying electrical tape, stick to name brands; I like 3M, which costs a bit more, but makes better repairs. In the example below, I use shrink wrap, which comes in different diameters. You want a diameter which will fit OVER the end of the terminal.


For my sample repair, I need a 2-ft length of 14-gauge wire, and need to crimp a (blue) female spade terminal to one end of the wire. Note that I've correctly matched the 14-gauge wire to a blue-coded terminal. THE FIRST COMMON MISTAKE IS INCORRECTLY

MATCHING THE WIRE AND TERMINAL SIZES. I've verified that the shrink wrap fits over the barrel end of my terminal. I will strip about 3/8" of insulation from the wire - enough so that when the stripped end is inserted into the terminal, a tiny bit peeks out, and bare copper is under the barrel where I will be crimp-Crimp terminals are color-coded for size: the smallest ing. THE SECOND COMMON MISTAKE IS STRIPare red (18-22 gauge wire), then blue (14-16 gauge), PING TOO LITTLE INSULATION SO THAT BARE


pull it off without also removing any copper strands. I took the photo using the 2nd-smallest size, but then ended up moving the wire to the next larger size. This takes some practice - try it out on several different

wire gauge sizes.

Before crimping the terminal, slide the shrink wrap onto the wire; if you're repairing an existing wire on the car, this may be your only chance to get it into position! With the terminal placed over the bare copper strands, verify that copper is under the barrel, Use the crimping part of the tool to firmly crush the barrel buy some wire and a terminal assortment, and praconto the wire. THE THIRD COMMON MISTAKE IS CRIMPING THE TERMINAL NEAR ONE OF ITS ENDS SO THAT THE CRIMP DOESN'T FIRMLY GRASP THE WIRE. A COROLLARY MISTAKE IS




Making crimp; blue connector is lined up with blue dot

USING A HAMMER & CHISEL. OR PLIERS TO MAKE THE CRIMP. USE A CRIMPING TOOL, PLEASE. In the photo, note that the barrel is crushed or some other combination; I have several, and they almost directly in the middle. Using moderate force, come in handy! pull on the terminal; it should feel securely attached and should not slide off. If it does, the crimp is inadequate, and you'll need to repeat the process.

Slide the shrink wrap over the terminal, and tancing.



half its original diameter, and the final repair looks very professional. You can use electric tape here also. The point of the shrink wrap or tape is to insulate your repair. THE FOURTH COMMON MISTAKE IS USING TAPE TO CONNECT THE TERMINAL TO THE WIRE. IT'S THE MECHANICAL CRUSH OF THE BARREL ON THE WIRE WHICH MAKES THE CONNECTION.

Installing crimp terminals takes some practice; tice before you need to make a repair to your car. I've

also used solderless terminals to make up my own test wires, whether it's to run temporary grounds, or run 12V from the battery to the rear of the car. These test wires may have alligator clips or spade terminals


