What's the Latest News About Our New **Building?**

here is good news on the resumption of construction on the new AACA National Headquarters and AACA Library & Research Center. The Governor of Pennsylvania has announced that the restrictions on construction will be lifted on May 1st. So, starting tomorrow the property will be open for delivery of materials and the subcontractors will be onsite on May 4th to continue the remodeling effort. All necessary provisions are being made and CDC guidelines will be followed to keep everyone safe and avoid any potential outbreak of the virus. This is exciting news, especially because our current building has been sold and the new owners must take possession on time.

In this difficult time in our world, there are so many very worthwhile charities that deserve support. We hope, if appropriate, that you will still consider AACA. Our building is not fully funded yet. n a beautiful Sunday afternoon with partly cloudy skies and temperatures in the high 70s, the Galloping Hill Cruisers Car Club (GHCs) organized and conducted a Drive-Thru Food Drive to collect non-perishable foods and cash donations for the local food pantries. The GHCs obtained approval from the governing body of the City of Linden to conduct this Drive-Thru Food Drive. The Food Drive was conducted at Aviation Plaza in the City of Linden in the parking lot opposite Pasquale's IV Pizzeria and Jersey Mike's Subs.

Members of various New Jersey car clubs were invited to volunteer to display their vehicles with the purpose of participating in and supporting the Drive-Thru Food Drive organized by the GHCs. The invited volunteers each submitted a required \$20.00 pre-registration donation and many if not most also donated cases of food. This was a test or trial run with strict guidelines in place on social distancing for the participants (volunteers). All display vehicles were stagger parked to meet "Social Distancing" guidelines (10 feet apart) and all "volunteers" were required to wear face coverings and to maintain "Social Distancing" guidelines (6 feet or more apart). No groups larger than 4 "volunteers" at a time were permitted. No spectators were allowed to walk through the display area. Several spectators were allowed to drive around the perimeter of the display area after dropping of their food and/or cash donations. No parking or strolling was allowed by these spectators.





To support the GHC's Drive-Thru Food Drive, members of the following car clubs came out with their beautiful antique classics, customs, modifies, hot rods, rat rods and modern vehicles: Raritan Bay Cruisers. Legendary Muscle Cars, Club 3, Fabio's Cruisers, NJ Region AACA, Street Dreams, Garden State Gear Shifters. This event was limited to 50 volunteers that were invited to participate and who had to pre-registered their show cars. The Drive-Thru Food Drive did however draw many other car enthusiasts who had to be turned away after they dropped off

uly 4th, 1968 was my very first ride in a vintage automobile. My dad loaned out a few of his boys to a friend who wanted to fill up his antique car for the parade. The experience became one of those great childhood memories you never forget. I love the Art Deco stove bolt Chevy design so it wasn't too hard to convince myself this was the vintage automobile I wanted. What I really wanted though was to give my nieces and nephews the chance to experience some of those childhood memories I so enjoyed when I was seven. I have five younger brothers, so lots of nieces and

nephews. A ¾ ton pick up can hold a lot of them in a parade.

The Art Deco styling craze was in full swing when Chevrolet updated the look of its trucks. ."The Right Trucks for all Trades," Chevrolet boasted in its 1941 advertisements. "Massive new truck styling making these Chevrolet trucks the best-looking, as well as the best-performing, trucks in the entire lowest-price field. "These models rode on wheelbases 1.5 inches longer than their predecessors because designers stretched the "Turret Top" cab's cowl, affording drivers more legroom and a new adjustable seat.

Chevrolet built over 300,000 trucks in 1946, compared to 36,000 in 1945. Pickup sizes included 1/2-ton, 3/4-ton, 1-ton and 1 1/4-ton, and designs were based on the 1941 models, the final year of full production before the war.

I've had the 46 for over a decade now and my nieces and nephews have grown up fast. They may not be as interested in riding in parades as they once were. I was surprised when one of my nephews asked to use the 46 for some of his wedding pictures. A pick up is not exactly a classic for a wedding shoot. He said its cool; we want to use it, can we? I said yes of course and I'm sharing a few pictures of the 46 taken on their wedding day. Yep, the 46 has left us with some great memories to cherish. That is what I like about my 46 Chevy the most, and it's still a 6 volt system!!!

The details: The 1946 Chevrolet 3600, 4speed pickup was sold May 10,1946 by Nance Chevrolet in Asheboro, NC and stayed in Asheboro with the original owner until 2002. The second owner was responsible for the





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Rich's Repair Ramblings,

MAY 2020: Maintaining the Modern Metal while sheltering in place.

Ithough I had promised last month to write about taking your classic car out for its inaugural drive of the season, current events have led me to address matters related to our everyday vehicles (presuming that you're not using your '52 Hudson for grocery store runs, although I think a few of you are). I'm referring to the fact that "sheltering in place" has resulted in a lot less driving, certainly for me and just as likely for you, and I've rubber material from which they are constructed. started to observe some problems with my modern car because of all that sitting.

on my daily driver. Last year, I bought a 2016 Volvo V60, which has been an absolute joy. When I picked it up in July of 2019, it had 50,000 miles on it; it got its oil changed in early March at 65,000 miles, so I've actually been averaging about 22,500 miles a year. Due to the coronavirus, by mid-March, my company had closed its office and told everyone to work from home. Then the state of NJ ordered non-essential travel to stop. In the last 6 weeks, I've driven my Volvo fewer than 300 miles! My annual rate of driving has dropped to about 2,500 miles a year, close to a tenth of what it was.

Along with that drop, I've had issues with battery warning messages and tires which go "thumpthump". I've also been concerned with the aging of mally associated with a collector car; for instance, my 1967 Alfa, in a good year, gets driven about 2,000 miles. But I'm used to a routine with the old iron, and now I've found I've needed to adapt a similar routine

to ensure that my modern wheels are also kept up to snuff.

Taking them one at a time, the 3 main concerns for the daily drivers which are seeing a lot less use are: 1, the battery; 2, the tires, and 3, the fuel.

THE BATTERY


A few weeks ago, I saw a warning message on my Volvo's instrument cluster that I didn't know existed: "Low Battery Charge". The infrequent driving I had been doing was to the supermarket, about 10 minutes away. I realized that my car was not being driven long enough for the charging system to replenish the battery.



Two weekends ago, for the first time since I stopped the daily commute, I went on a one-hour drive, and the message disappeared. But I also realized that I needed to put a trickle charger on the battery. The lesson is, don't presume that a newer car means that the battery is OK! Even for your newer set of wheels, batteries don't like to sit for long periods of time. Put a trickle charger on it, and if possible, take the car for a longer ride at least several times a month.

THE TIRES

All tires lose air. It's a function of the natural While some tires do a better job of maintaining air pressure than others, again, it's a fact that sooner or In a normal year, I'll put around 20,000 miles later, some air will migrate through the rubber.



These tires on your car or truck are also sitting the fuel in my tank. All of these worries are more nor- for longer periods of time with significant weight on them. 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
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
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
