

The 752nd NJ Region AACA meeting was held in person at the Morris Plains VFW and called to order at approximately 8:01 P.M. by President Gregory Roser, who led members and guests in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Guests and New members in attendance: new members Larry and Melissa Malloy were in attendance.

**Meeting Minutes:** A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to accept the minutes from the February Region meeting, as published in the March issue of the Road Map.

Correspondence, Sarah Pritchett: None.

**Treasurer's Report, Tim Schimmel:** A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to accept the treasurer's report.

#### President's Report, Gregory Roser:

- 1. Greg thanked outgoing Banquet Chairperson Pat Hogan for a very successful Region Banquet held on Sunday, April 3rd. He also thanked members Rich Reina and Vince DeLisi for providing a slideshow of the 1939 VMCCA Glidden Tour for members to view during the banquet. In addition, he reminded the Region that incoming Banquet Chairperson Betty Allen is excited to take on this position, even though she does not have a car, she is a frequent back-seat rider and enjoys the people.
- 2. Members who were absent from the banquet that won awards received them during the meeting if they were present. Greg has the awards of members who were unable to make it to the meeting, to be given when they are present in the future. - 3. Greg announced that members are needed to step up to help out in various positions for our upcoming Spring Meet on Sunday, May 1st.

**Glidden Tour, Vince DeLisi & Jerry Peck:** In Jerry's absence, Vince provided updates regarding planning this event.

- 1. A question was raised previously concerning the ability for club members to attend the individual tours in modern vehicles, and an official answer has been returned: No, unless the members are working the tour.
- 2. The Hospitality Room will be accepting baked goods each night, if any member is interested and willing to supply treats, contact Vince and/or Jerry.
- 3. The South Jersey Region will be helping to park trailers
- 4. They have raised \$650 in advertisements so far
- 5. Tote bags will be donated by an agency
- 6. Mecum is donating back packs
- 7. Summit Racing is donating \$225 worth of gift certificates for their products as well as hats and a large six-foot banner.
- 8. Wayne Tuck is arranging a private car collection in Stockton, NJ.
- 9. The Opening Banquet will be set at a farm; they are working on setting prices for NJ Region members to attend
- 10. The Closing Banquet will cost \$75 per person if any Region Members are interested in attending.

n March 27th a mother of three children reached out to the Sunshine Foundation asking for help with the following request "I'm reaching out to see if it is at all possible to help me with a birthday wish request for our son Josiah (JoJo) our miracle child! JoJo was born with multiple disabilities and as he grows, he faces more challenges and findings in his health complications. The most recent challenge is this massive tumor that took over 75%+ of the bone structure of his face. He almost lost his vision and ability to walk, the doctors had to remove this tumor ......... JoJo underwent his first surgery to remove the tumor to allow his face to reshift back into place in July. Four months later it grew back and this time he required 11.5 hours in the OR. Sadly, JoJo's tumor has returned. He's a very happy child and well known in our area however JoJo is losing his desire and will to fight this tumor."

#### Friday, May 20

We will be visiting the Stoogeum, a museum dedicated to the Three Stooges founded by one of their nieces. It is in Ambler, PA which is about 15 miles south of Doylestown. Prior to that we will have lunch at a restaurant close to it. They have only recently reopened and do require, at the time of this writing, that a mask be worn. Our appointment is at 2:00 and lasts for two hours when they ask people to leave.

Admission prices are as follows:

\$10 adults; \$8 seniors (65+), students (13+ with ID), military (with ID); FREE children 12 and under.

The Stoogeum accepts cash, checks, and credit cards as payment at the admissions desk and in the gift shop.

Leaving at 10:30 from the starting location of the Flemington Diner, 324 NJ-31, Flemington NJ, 08822. It can be reached by taking Route 31 south from I-78 for approximately 8 miles. It will be on the west side in the Stop and Shop shopping center where there is a stoplight.

#### NJ Region AACA Revised Point System Vince DeLisi: January 7, 2021

#### General terms and conditions:

- Point year shall begin on December 1 and end on November 30.
- Member must legibly sign the sign-in sheet, including membership number.
- In the case of national meets, participating member must notify the Point Chair within 30 days.
- Point standings of the top 50 members will be published in the Road Map in May, July, September, and February.
- It is the chairman's responsibility to notify the Points Chair if an event includes a monetary donation.

In order for a meet or gathering of any type to be considered a point event by the Vice President, it shall satisfy the following criteria:

- A member of the NJ Region must be the Meet Chairman or serve as the event coordinator.
- 2. All members of the NJ Region must be eligible to participate.
- 3. All AACA eligible vehicles must be eligible to participate.
- 4. The meet must be scheduled and placed on the calendar by the Vice President.
- 5. The event must be published at least once in the Road Map prior to the scheduled event or be the subject of an official email to all members at least 10 days in advance of the gathering.
- 6. In order for a member to receive points, adequate "participation in an event" shall be determined by the meet chairman or event coordinator. They may delete or strike a member's name from the sign-up sheet or participation sheet if, in their opinion, a member's participation is less than adequate.

#### Participation Point Rules:

- 1. Attendance at a Region point meeting or event of any kind 20 points.
- 2. Attendance at a Region Judging Seminar 50 points.
- 3. AACA National meetings & events:

#### Rich's Repair Ramblings May 2022

My Favorite Shop Tools: The Impact Driver When I began my career as an automotive technician, one of the first lessons I learned (and often learned the hard way) is that there is always the "right" tool for the job. Using an inferior or incorrect tool will at best, slow down the process; at worst, it will waste untold minutes, or potentially cause damage. (And flat-rate techs do NOT have minutes to waste or time to replace fasteners they have damaged.)

There's no doubt that the shop foreman at my first job, a gregarious Irishman named Andy Finnegan, introduced me to this tool. Where there is doubt is exactly what it was I was trying to fix. This was the late 1970s, before the high-torque cordless drills had come into widespread use, and I was (again) struggling with loosening a stubborn screw of some kind. Andy, who had infinite patience with me, said "try this", as he handed me his Snap-On hammer-driven Impact Driver. Once I had the correct bit installed on its 3/8" drive nose, he instructed me to insert the bit into the screw, twist the driver to the left, and hit the end of it with a hammer. An internal spring increased the counter-clockwise twisting force from the hammer's blow, while the impact drove the bit deeper into the screwhead, preventing the bit from slipping. In a matter of moments, the screw that I was struggling to remove was out.

I already owned several air-driven tools, namely my 3/8" drive ratchet and ½" drive impact gun. They worked great with sockets on typical hex-head bolts. The primary problem with using either of those on a slotted or Philips head fastener was slippage. The torque came about too quickly, and the bit would "cam out", meaning it would jump out of the fastener. The air tools were great with six- or twelve-sided sockets where the fit was tighter and the risk of camming out was lower.

After borrowing the tool from Andy, I obtained one of my own the next time the Snap On tool truck came by (and as a tech, climbing into that truck was like a kid entering a toy store). I probably paid around \$100 for the kit, which included the driver and seven slotted and Philips bits in various sizes. It wasn't a tool I used every week, but

for me, somewhat weak in the muscular effort department, it was a great comfort to know the tool was there if I needed it. On the Volvos I wrenched on, various body fasteners were Philips heads, and were especially tight. The fasteners were also non-standard sizes, so stripping one out would mean asking the Parts Manager to special-order a replacement. It was at moments like those that the technician in me appreciated the hundred-dollar expenditure.

When in the middle of restoring my BMW Isetta, I rebuilt the Dynastart, the combination starter motor/generator mounted to the nose of the crankshaft. The magnets in the Dynastart were held in place by special-sized slotted head screws, and they were tight! The only way they were successfully removed was by using the Impact Driver. I probably installed them with the same tool, as twisting the tool to the right and hammering it resulted in further tightening of the fastener. So the tool delivered that extra force either clockwise or counter-clockwise.

Forty plus years later, the tool, taking up little space in the toolbox, is still in my possession. I couldn't tell you the last time I used it, but that does not matter. What matters is knowing that it's there when I need it. In fact, the hinges on the passenger door of my Alfa Romeo need repairing, and they are held in place with Philips head screws. When the

time comes, those screws will be removed with this impact driver!

The tool is still available new from Snap On. I also see it available used on eBay, and likely other online sites too. If you semi-regularly deal with difficult-to-loosen slotted or Philips head screws, I highly recommend this impact driver as the tool to get the job done.

(This is the first in a series of articles about some of my favorite shop tools. Next month will feature another favorite tool.)

More details about the tour stops will be provided in a future article. We are looking forward to another interesting, if not relaxing, fall weekend with our fellow Region members!



rom February 22<sup>nd</sup> - February 26<sup>th</sup>; The Cape Canaveral Region kicked off the 2022 AACA Nationals season with exciting activities, great food, wonderful weather, and a terrific National Car Show capped off a tremendous week.



The American Muscle Car Museum, owned by Mark and Tetiana Pieloch, hosted the event this year. During Thursday's seafood feast AACA members got a little taste as to what to expect for the upcoming days. When members entered the main rotunda, there was a vast collection of Ford GT's, antique motorcycles and bicycles, antique boat motors, vintage gas pumps (restorations on a large percentage of the pumps done by Past Gas Co. owned by Cape Canaveral Region member Walter "Koz" Kostrzewa). AACA members eagerly awaited Friday's ice cream social, as the doors that were locked the night before finally opened, giving everyone the opportunity to see over 300 antique and current muscle cars. The collection had everything from let with matching Mullens trailer, owned by Gerald Porsches, Mopars, Camaros, Corvettes, Mustangs, and Dodge Vipers. The collection also housed a collection of Indianapolis 500 Pace Cars from various years and makes, including a 1955 Chevrolet Bel Air Convertible -1 of 10 Indy Pace Cars built for that year. My personal favorite of course was a Brittany Blue 1967 Shelby GT 500, which brought me back to the days of my childhood, helping my grandfather restore his. The collection was also home to vehicles on loan from the Jerry Miller Collection, one of which was an Amelia Island Concourse Winning Car - a Gun Metal Gray and Geranium 1959 Ford Fairlaine Galaxie Skyliner with a retractable top. The collection also included antique tractors, motorcycles, and military vehicles. For Saturday's Judges breakfast, the AACA judges had the opportunity to peek in to see the Muscle Car Museums maintenance garage. a state-of-the-art garage that all us gear heads wish we had at our disposal.

Owner and founder of the American Muscle Car Museum Mark Pieloch; employs roughly twenty full time employees and has over seventy volunteers who dedicate their time to ensure all visitors and guests have the most memorable experience. While my meeting with Mr. Pieloch was brief - his love and knowledge for classic cars shows, and he lives and breathes to ensure the success of the AACA and the hobby. I was privileged to work with three of his most trusted liaisons for three days. Andrew Mackey who serves as the Social Media

and Event Coordinator – who promoted the National to the likes I have never seen. This AACA National had to have been the most publicized and marketed event that drew a public crowd of thousands comparable to Hershey's Saturday Fall National. Ed Dedick serves as the Operations and Restoration Manager; he is the man that all the vehicles must go through before and after they are transported to various events throughout the country. Ed graciously gave up his Sunday afternoon for me to have a private tour of the collection, and I am forever thankful and grateful for that. Ryan Colin serves as a restoration technician at the facility. These three gentlemen made it an experience of a lifetime. They were more than accommodating, assisting with any subtle or last-minute changes.

Saturday's Winter Nationals kicked off with the gates opening at 7am, AACA National President and past New Jersey Region President Wayne Tuck greeted each participant with a smile, a beautiful dash plaque and gratitude for everyone's participation. New Jersey Region member Leif Mangulson served as Chief Judge for the 221 vehicles and 129 National Judges. The oldest vehicle on the show field was a 1903 Cadillac A owned by Past AACA president Jim Elliott and his wife Donna. A few cars caught my eye - that could have been best in show, if that award were given. The first was a 1967 Amphicar owned by Ronald Green of Camp Hill, PA – I don't know what my fascination is; but these cars are so unique and innovative in design and capabilities. The other vehicle was a 1935 Ford 48-760 Cabrio-



Houck of Merritt Island, FL. Having previously spoken to Mr. Houck on the phone in regard to 1 of his 4 vehicles I can understand why he wanted the trailer to be included with his car. Both vehicles mentioned above did receive their First Junior Awards. While the Southeastern States had the largest participation rate, the furthest vehicles came from Indiana and New Hampshire. 


