2022 GLIDDEN TOUR UPDATE What you need to know

These past three months have been a whirlwind of planning activities for next year's "Glidden Tour". During this time, we signed two hotel contracts that enabled us to reserve one hundred and forty rooms between the Crown Plaza Hotel in Plainsboro and the Westin Hotel in Princeton. Securing these contracts was the highest priority for our upcoming tour.

The next highest priority was finding a park- Advertising sales, if appropriate - open ing lot which could accommodate about one hundred and thirty flatbed trailers and their tow vehicles. We've many vacant parking lots surrounding our hotels, but commercial realtors are unwilling to commit to our using any of them at this early stage. Fortunately, the Westin appears to have all of the dedicated space that we need to accommodate all of us.

We've visited countless Revolutionary War sites throughout New Jersey and have been able to concentrate the most significant of them into five, separate, weekday tours that will occur between September 26-30, 2022. The tours will cover Trenton and Washington Crossing, Washington's Head- Nationals Trifold - Jay DeBoey quarters, the Princeton Battlefield, the Monmouth Permits - Bobbi & Dick Bettle Battlefield, and a full day of touring Bucks County.

We're expecting upward of one hundred and Post Tour Settlement w/ AACA - Suds, Vince & PJ eighty pre-1942 vehicles and about four hundred Registrar - Vince DeLisi and twenty-five participants. Because of the limited facilities that many Silent auction – if appropriate – Denise Tuck Revolutionary War sites have, we may have to subdivide them still further and/or have them leave the hotel at scheduled departure times. The size of our group, relative to the limitations of the sites we intend to visit, will add a layer of complexity that past Glidden Tours have never had to face.

Our five Tour Guides will have a big job ahead of them. They'll have to plan their tours, in their entirety and know the histories and back-

ground information of all their intended sites. They'll need to precisely plan their routes through secondary roads and organize a lunch for everyone. Finally, to fulfill a few longstanding "Glidden Tour traditions", they'll have to plan for a morning coffee break and a mid-afternoon treat, in many instances. Surely, they'll have the full support of their assistants and the tour committee. Also, they'll need the willing assistance of all of you to help shoulder at least a small part of this demanding undertaking, so please, step up by raising your hand. Thank you.

SAVE THE DATE 2021 Region Fall Foliage Tour Lukan's Farm Resort, Hawley, PA October 15-17, 2021



Rich's Repair Ramblings September 2021 All About Antifreeze: Part 1 **History and Properties**

(Authors's Note: AACA members with Citroen 2CV, Corvair, Fiat 500, Franklin, Isetta, Porsche 356/912/early 911/914, Tatra, Trabant, and VW Type 1, 2, 3, and 4 automobiles may continue reading with bemused smirks on your faces. All others should pay attention!)


An internal combustion automobile engine creates a tremendous amount of heat which will cause extensive engine damage unless there is some sort of mechanism to carry that heat away. While some engines are air-cooled, using a combination of fans, shrouding, and finned engine externals (greater surface area) to force ambient air around an engine's exterior, most automotive engines are liquidcooled. Such engines employ a cooling system, circulating a liquid through the engine's internal passages, which transfers the heat from the engine to the cooling medium. (The 2nd Law of Thermodynamics states that heat moves from higher temperature bodies to lower temperature bodies.) The hot liquid is then pumped to a heat exchanger (radiator), where the heat is released to the atmosphere. The now-cooler liquid is circulated back into the engine and the cycle begins anew.

medium for engine cooling. Its two main drawbacks are its propensity to cause corrosion when interacting with certain metals, and the temperature limits within which it will remain in a liquid state (water freezes at 32 degrees F/zero degrees C and boils at 212 degrees F/100 degrees C). Once it's no longer a liquid, it cannot perform its job to carry away engine heat.

Most of us know that our "water-cooled" engines glycol to help prevent inadvertent consumption. actually use some percentage of a substance called anti- My copy of the 6th Edition of the Bosch Automotive Handfreeze, diluted with water. Automotive reference books book (published in 2004) contains a chart of freezing and

it is noted that water alone was initially used as a coolant, it was also recognized that anyone living where temperatures fell below freezing would risk engine damage if the cooling system wasn't drained first. (Liquid water, if allowed to freeze, will expand slightly. Difficult to believe, but true, is the fact that water which is allowed to freeze inside an engine block can cause the block to crack.)

There is some consensus that a French chemist. Charles Adolphe Wurtz, was the first to formulate the substance he named ethylene glycol in 1859. Among its early uses was in the manufacture of explosives. A U.S. plant to manufacture ethylene glycol was opened in 1925 by the company which became Union Carbide, and 1926 saw its first use in automotive cooling systems when it was discovered that its freezing point was below that of plain water.

Interestingly, two additional properties of ethylene Plain old water (H2O) is actually a very efficient glycol were discovered: one, its freezing point could be brought even lower when mixed with water; and two, when used in a pressurized closed cooling system, its boiling point was raised to that above plain water. One downside of the stuff is that it has a "sweet" taste to creatures who wouldn't know better than to ingest it (children and animals) and it is extremely toxic when swallowed. To its credit, the antifreeze industry has added bittering agents to ethylene

have little to say about the early history of antifreeze. While boiling points of water-glycol mixture ratios. At 10% glycol

(90% water), the freezing point drops to 25 F and the boiling point to 214 F. A 30% mix improves that to a freezing point of 1 degree F and a boiling point of 220 F. Finally, a 50/50 mixture won't freeze until the temperature drops to -38 F, and won't boil until it climbs to 226 F. Clearly, the 50/50 solution suffices for almost all driving situations in the U.S.

Over time, chemical engineers added corrosion inhibitors to antifreeze to minimize any corrosive effects on the materials of both the engine and the radiator, including cast iron, aluminum, copper, and brass. As engines and their related systems became more and more complex, engineers from various auto manufacturers also started specifying antifreezes formulated in new and improved ways (and color-keyed to distinguish them from one another).

Similar to most fluids used in vehicular applications, antifreeze has a lifespan beyond which its protective qualities have deteriorated. When that happens, it's time for a drain / flush / refill. The type of antifreeze needed for your jalopy, along with the correct percentage of water to add, should be matters of attention when performing this service.
