1967 Oldsmobile Cutlass

Carol & Rick Weingart

The story of how my wife Carol and I came to own a 1967 Oldsmobile Cutlass started 55 years ago when my father-in-law presented Carol with a Green 1967 Oldsmobile Cutlass as a graduation gift. At the time, I was stationed at McCoy AFB in Orlando, Fl at the time a sleepy little town in the middle of Florida (not so sleepy now but 54 years ago it wasn't much). McCoy AFB is now Orlando International Airport. A year after Carol's graduation, we got married and headed to Florida in the Oldsmobile pulling a U-Haul. For the next two years, we drove the Oldsmobile all over Florida to Miami, Kennedy Space Center, MLB spring training games and back to New Jersey. We kept the car for 6-7 years, but eventually it came time to think about a bigger car or station wagon as we were ready to have baby #2. So, we parted with the Oldsmobile and moved on.

Fast forward...years 48 and 2017 is coming up and it will be 50 years since we hit the road to Florida in Carol's 1967 Oldsmobile. I hit it out of the park for her 70th birthday with a 1962 Buick Electra 225, Convertible so how was I going to top that? Looking back at albums, I see the Oldsmobile on the beach in Daytona, in front of deco hotels in Miami, and spring training games for the Dodgers and Yankees. We brought our daughter home from the hospital in the Olds. I decided for our 50th wedding anniversary, I would find that 67 Oldsmobile or

one just like it.



I started a quest for THE CAR with the search focusing on: Aspen Green, black interior and vinyl top. I thought how hard could it be to find a car that was one of Oldsmobile's most popular models as thousands where produced. I had looked for the Oldsmobile for her Birthday with no luck, so I prepared for a long search. I joined the Oldsmobile Club of America and advertised monthly looking for a 1967 Aspen Green Oldsmobile coupe with vinyl top but nothing happened. I guess it wasn't out there. I got calls about red, yellow and different shades of green, and fellow car enthusiasts would tell me just repaint the car, but that is not the plan I had in mind.



The outlook was looking bleak, and here it was December of 2017 and I had less than a year to go, when I received a call from Brian Anderson, an Oldsmobile Club member in Minnesota, telling me he has the Oldsmobile I am looking for. The car was in a storage garage with bad lighting, but the color looked good. Brian said we would have to wait for the snow to melt to get it outside. Brian had bought the car 10 years earlier in California in hopes of reselling it. When the snow finally melted he got the Oldsmobile outside and sent more pictures. It was the one - correct color interior and the Green I wanted, but it did not have a black vinyl roof. I knew I could put vinyl on so I bought the car.

In July of 2018, I made arrangements to ship the Oldsmobile to Somerset Hills Classics in Bernardsville, New Jersey to have it checked out and put the vinyl top

on. We were down to crunch time with only weeks to go. Our plan was to go to a Somerville Cruise night and have the car on the street for the presentation, but rain cancelled that event. Then my wife decided she wanted to go to Florida for our anniversary, so now we are down to one week. My son and daughter come up with the plan for a family dinner before we left for Florida. We went to the Stirling Inn located in Stirling. A family friendly place for kids, and a lawn area to park cars. My son-lawn drove the car to Stirling and parked it away from where we were sitting. While Carol was distracted, I drove the



Oldsmobile right up to where we are sitting so she could see it, the rest, as they say is History. Pictures show it went over very well, and we are having so much fun in the same car we drove 50 plus year ago.

After getting to know the Oldsmobile we discovered it was assembled in Fremont, CA, and came with an Anti-Pollution system. We also realized that after 50 years the front seats and carpet were worn and deteriorated to the point where they needed to be replaced with new original carpet and upholstery. 1959 Hillman Minx

This is the story of a funny little car that belonged to several members of the New Jersey Region. The story actually started for me back in the 1990's when I was contacted by Doug Bragg of Baltimore, Maryland. His first car had been a 1959 Hillman Minx "Special" back when he was high school and he was looking for another one. I gave him some possible sources and suggested that he subscribe to Hemmings Motor News. A few years later Doug located a car being sold out of a large car collection in the Hamptons of Long Island. Given the timing and location, I always wondered if it had been part of Henry Austin Clark's old museum. Doug told me that when he got the car it was covered with tree sap and required extensive cleaning to get through the sticky goo. He also said that the car had originally come from West Virginia. Doug did a great deal of work on the car, even going to England to obtain a complete, new brake system. This included wheel cylinders, a master cylinder, lines and relined brake shoes. Not content with one Hillman, Doug purchased a 1962 Minx "1600" sedan and then a 1960 Minx convertible (but with a 1958 engine), a 1958 sedan for parts and finally an immaculately restored 1959 Hillman Minx Deluxe sedan from a retired Hillman

dealer in Montreal, Canada. The Canadian fellow even had all of the original decals installed on the car. Doug was instrumental in founding the "Hillman List" on the internet and built a garage to house his growing collection of Hillmans. Then sadly, tragedy struck. Doug was diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer and only given a short time to live. Even though he had good medical coverage, he still needed some money. As the 1959 Minx Special was his favorite car, he offered it to me for \$1,000. I had recently sold my 1973 Plymouth Cricket (which was the American version of the Hillman Avenger) so I had an empty spot in my old car garage. I bought the car and trailered it back to New Jersey. Unfortunately, although Doug had done much work on the car it still needed many things done to it. The most vital being new front and rear window rubber. I was able to source new (recently made) rubber from Scott's Old Rubber in Australia. Unfortunately Doug had worn through the paint in trying polish the car so a local paint

shop did a respray for me in the original black color. As a side note, I arranged for Doug to sell the 1959 DeLuxe sedan to another friend of mine (and Hillman nut) Craig Burlingame of Seattle. I took the car to a number of British car meets and noticed that the oil pressure fell off once the car was warm. This was not an un-common problem in Hillmans (and Sunbeam Alpines) and was caused by a worn out spring in oil pressure relief valve. An afternoon's work allowed me to convert the oil pressure valve to an adjustable one and the oil pressure was back to where it should be. In 2011 I joined the

New Jersey region and quickly became friends with both Earle Genges and Mat Varzi. Earle was the old fellow who looked like Santa Claus and had a number of very collectable old cars. He had a rather beat up MG Magnette sedan, a very nice Triumph TR6, a restored Willys Jeepster, a Triumph 2000 roadster and an unrestored Jowett Jupiter. He and I ran into each other at the various British car shows throughout northern New Jersey, including the New Jersey Triumph club's show in Hillsborough, just down the road from Earle's house. Earle fell in love with my 1959 Minx and offered to buy it from me many times. Finally I succumbed as he really liked the car. I sold it to him for \$2,000 which represented a loss to me because I had put much more than that into it (the paint alone cost that much). Earle enjoyed taking the car to local shows and it was even at the last Automatic Switch Company show of the New Jersey Region. Unfortunately I did not know that Earle, like Doug before him also had terminal cancer. Earle had pancreatic cancer and died about a year after I sold him the car. Earle's estate was handled by New Jersey Region member Matt Varzi. Matt sold off Earle's house, cars etc and donated the money to charities that Earle had named. The Minx went to a buyer in Connecticut. This fellow quickly flipped the car to a buyer in California. Unfortunately I do not know what happened to the car after that.



Brake Rotor Replacement

We will conclude our ongoing series on brake system work by discussing disc brake rotor replacement in some detail. First, some important points: While disc brake pads are designed to wear out (actual service time depends greatly on driving habits, however, a good generalization is that a typical set of pads will last between 10,000 and 40,000 miles), it is NOT necessary to replace the brake discs or rotors every time the pads are replaced! If a repair shop recommends rotor replacement, you are well within your rights to ask why. The rotor wear surface will show some groove marks, which are completely normal. The concern is, how deep are those grooves? A simple rule-of-thumb is to check whether a fingernail catches on a groove. If not, then it is likely that the rotor is still serviceable. If a fingernail does catch, then some more precise measuring is called for. The most important measurement is overall rotor thickness. It is required that a number representing "minimum thickness" be stamped somewhere on the rotor. If a micrometer measurement reveals that the rotor has worn to a point less than this minimum thickness, it must be replaced.

What about rotor resurfacing or machining? When I started my professional automotive career in the 1970s, rotor machining was a very popular service repair. However, two things have changed since then. Forty years ago, rotors were thicker, so that machining a few thousandths of an inch from them was unlikely to make them too thin. The other big change over the last half-

century has been the flip-flop in the parts/labor ratio. When I was a pup, labor was (relatively) cheap and parts were pricey. Today, it's the opposite. My own suggestion is that if your car's rotors are worn, replacing them with new is the better option over a resurfacing repair, and may not cost any more money than the machine shop work. When you're ready to replace rotors, the brake



caliper must be unbolted from the car. Look at any disc brake assembly photo and you will see that the caliper "straddles" the rotor; it must do so for the pads to clamp on the disc. On fixed caliper systems (pistons on both sides of the caliper), the entire caliper is unbolted and swung out of the way. On floating or sliding caliper systems (piston or pistons on only one side of the caliper), the main portion of the caliper is unbolted and swung out of the way AND the caliper bracket must be



unbolted and removed.

Don't make this rookie mistake: IT IS NOT NECESSARY TO DISCONNECT THE HYDRAULIC BRAKE LINE FROM THE CALIPER WHEN REPLACING THE ROTOR. As you line up your tools to


perform the job, before you unbolt the caliper, have at hand a piece of mechanic's wire or some strong bungee cords. I keep some old wire clothes hangers at hand, which I have cut to various lengths and have pre-bent hooks into their ends. When you unbolt the caliper, do NOT let it hang by its hydraulic line or hose! Swing it upward and use the wire/bungee cord to suspend the caliper from a suspension component. If you have undone the hydraulic line, you'll need to bleed the system, a totally unnecessary part of the job.

With the caliper out of the way, on some cars, the rotor will pop right off. Some vehicles hold the rotor in place with a small set screw; be careful, as that set screw may be hidden by rust or dirt. If the rotor does not come off by hand, use a hammer and make some light taps around the center, or "hat", which can dislodge any corrosion that may be holding the rotor in place. Many cars have a parking brake assembly consisting of a set of brake shoes operating on the inside of the rotor's "hat". I have had cases where such a parking brake mechanism has rusted badly, making it extremely difficult to remove the rotor. I've had to use the BFH to get the rotor off. But be careful – you don't want to damage the parking brake, wheel bearing, or axle assembly. In a worst-case scenario, spray some rust-busting solvent around the area and give it a few hours to penetrate.

With the old rotor off, it's time to install the new rotor. And here's another Best Practice: before installing it, clean the contact surfaces with brake cleaner or a similar solvent. New rotors are coated with a film to protect them from rusting during shipping and storage. You want to remove that film from both sides before mounting it to the car.



As the repair manuals love to state, "assembly is the reverse of disassembly". But first, use a wire brush to remove any rust build-up on the mating surfaces. Reattach the set screw holding the rotor in place. Reinstall the caliper and bracket. I'm sure those mounting bolts were very tight when you removed them; they must be equally tight on reinstallation. It's a good idea to look up the torque spec for them and use a torque wrench. Some techs like to use a locking fluid on the caliper bolts, although I have personally not seen the need for that if the bolts are torqued correctly. While reinstalling the caliper, depending on whether you are servicing the pads at the same time, take the time to lubricate the sliding pins; it's best to use a specific brake lubricant for that job. And of course, keep that lube off the rotor contact surfaces!

When starting the car for its first drive after rotor replacement, the same warning applies as when the pads are replaced. While the car is in Park (or in neutral with the parking brake applied), pump the brake pedal a few times until you feel a hard firm pedal. Try to avoid any hard brake pedal applications for the first several hundred miles. Let's hope you don't need to replace the rotors again for many tens of thousands of miles!

Next time: we will examine a car's steering systems.

Every day started with a great breakfast in the lobby, prior to departing for each day's touring from the convenient location. Preliminary plans are to revisit this location for the 2023 Region Summer tour! Here is a rundown of the daily activities:

Day 1 – Thursday: After meeting in the Mt. Bethel Diner, our first stop was the Central New York Living



History Center in Cortland, NY. The Center is a three-in-one set of divergent museums: (1) the Brockway Museum which housed many trucks produced by the Brockway Truck Company, originally located in Cortland, NY; (2) the Homeville Military Museum, a collection of Military items spanning the Civil War through the Gulf War, local



history, and model railroad layouts. A Vietnam Warera tank, a Jeep, and a GMC transport truck from the Korean War, as well as a wooden Thompson boat made in Cortland are also included; and (3)



Tractors of Yesteryear Museum, antique tractors and farm equipment from the Central NY Tractor Club. Also featured in the agricultural display is "Grandma's Parlor" which is a rural living area that showcases early items that were seen in parlors,



kitchens and households across early America.

Day 2 – Friday: A busy day. First, we took a scenic 1 hour ride to the Auburn NY Welcome Center with its



exhibition titled "Seeing Equal Rights in NYS". Harriet Tubman, who was instrumental in helping



lead slaves to freedom on the Underground Railroad was a centerpiece of the exhibit. We also visited U.S. Secretary of State William H. Seward's house. Seward signed a treaty with Russia for the purchase of Alaska for \$7 million (approximately



two cents an acre). Seward was also a target of the plot to assassinate Lincoln and top governmental approximately the same time, as the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln. Still in Auburn, we went to the Willard Memorial Chapel which was designed and built between 1892-1894 by Tiffany and Co. The Chapel is believed to be the only



complete and unaltered Tiffany chapel known to exist. Included in the interior are 14 opalescent windows, a rose window, a large figure window of Jesus and Peter, nine Mooresque styled chandeliers, memorial tablets of glass mosaic tile and gilt bronze, furnishings of oak inlaid with metal and glass mosaic, a ceiling with gold leaf stencils and mosaic flooring. The tour of the Chapel was followed by a leisurely drive to Skaneateles. The 44th Annual Antique and Classic Boat Show was



being held on the beach, and we wandered around looking at the festival offerings. Docked along the pier were quite a few midcentury boats including a 1932 Chris-Craft Model 300, a 1955 Penn Yan Sealiner and a 1955 Wagemaker Wolverine. After lunch, we all boarded the Judge Ben Wiles tour boat for a narrated one hour ride on the lake. Afterwards, a one hour scenic drive back to the hotel.

Day 3 – Saturday: Another 1 hour scenic drive brought us to Sacketts Harbor, where we visited the United Presbyterian Church. The original buildings (built in 1819) were destroyed by a fire in the village in 1843; a second building was destroyed by fire in April 2, 1899. A new building was constructed on officials. He was attacked on the same night, at the same site, cornerstone laid September 5,



1899, and dedicated August 2, 1900. It was built of brick to minimize damage in case of another fire in the village. A tower was built to house 10 chimes and the village library. By 1920, the library had



outgrown its space and is now located next door. We had two musicians in our fold, who took advantage of the opportunity to play the original pipe organ in the church, to the pleasure of all! After a quick tour of the village and self-guided tour of the Sackets Harbor Battlefield we enjoyed a picnic buffet lunch at the vintage family home of Region members Tex and Linda Sorrell, where Kathy Bagley played their antique pump organ to the delight of Linda Sorrel. As if we didn't have enough crammed into this day, we all went to Sorrell's cottage on Lake Ontario to enjoy a dip in the lake (which was warmer than the pool at the hote!!). A





quick change back into our clothes, and it was back to the hotel, then Tully's in Liverpool for dinner.

Day 4 – Sunday: Off on a scenic 45 minute drive to Oswego, where we toured the Safe Haven Holocaust Refugee Shelter Museum. A rather thought provoking example of generosity coupled with total thoughtlessness. The 982 men, women and children refugees who had been in concentration camps and escaped had been specially selected for the trip during WW2. They were families and survivors with skills that could help run a camp in America. The refugees were from all parts of Europe, had little ability to communicate with each other. It took the group two weeks to cross the ocean aboard a troop transport ship made for American soldiers, with bunks that



slept six stacked on top of each other. Half of the ship was full of wounded soldiers. The ship first pulled into New York harbor to the sight of the Statue of Liberty. After that symbol of freedom, however, there were other symbols awaiting them. A train, reminder of the ones bound for Auschwitz and Bergen-Belsen, carried the refugees north to a decommissioned military base at Fort Ontario. Barbed wire fences and military personnel greeted them at the fort's barracks - their new home. In juxtaposition to these sights, the "guests" of President Franklin D. Roosevelt were given food, shelter, an education and were accepted by the people of Oswego. Eventually, most decided to petition to stay in the United States. Next, the group walked over to visit the rest of the Fort Ontario State Historic Site, a star-shaped fort built on the ruins of three earlier fortifications which were the site of three French and Indian War and two War of 1812 battles. The current fort dates to the early 1840's with 1863 to 1872 improvements. There are two guardhouses, a powder magazine, a storehouse, enlisted men's barracks, an Army office building and unfurnished officer's quarters, videos, exhibits, underground stone rooms with embrasures for firing guns or missiles and ramparts featuring magnificent views of Lake Ontario.



The H. Lee White Maritime Museum at Oswego contains displays on shipwrecks, old captain logs, and the old 1881 Fresnel light lens from the Port of Oswego lighthouse. The Museum's main facility was converted from a grain elevator that formerly rested on the northern end of the structure. The building has a steel frame, tile walls with a smooth



stucco exterior finish, and a plaster finished interior, the floors are concrete in construction. The museum is that its built right on the water, so when you are inside, it actually feels like you are on a ship. The museum is home to the U.S. Army Transport LT-5 Major Elisha K. Henson, a critical ship from World War II. Built in 1943, it was at the Nomandy invasion in WWII. Her mission was to be a supply ship for the forces that were going out onto the shores. However, our guide pointed out the "downed plane" symbol on the smoke stack indicated that this ship was the only LT-5 to have shot down an enemy plane.

We were able to tour the 1927 Derrick Barge, which served as a work boat on the New York State Canal System, for almost 60 years. This barge did everything from repairing locks to ensuring other



boats had the supplies they needed. The Derrick itself can actually lift its own weight. The technology, is actually still used today.

Day 5 – Monday: On the way home, we stopped at the Norwich Auto Museum. With over 170 classic



and vintage cars and 28 motorcycles on display in 5 climate-controlled buildings, what's not to love. They have classic cars from the 20's to the 60's,



including some that Brooke sat in. Handmade Muscle cars including street rods and rat rods; a Pre-War Collection of electric, steam and combustion engines; a Post-War Collection from the late 40's through 1980's; Franklins, made from 1902-1934, including the 3rd one ever built and the





last one off the line. The "Made in New York" section showcasing O-we-go, Pierce Arrow and a Chenango Camper; Vintage Motorcycles and WWI and WWII Airplane Engines. If you love classic and



antiques cars, take the trip. It's only around 188 miles from Parsippany! Well worth your time.


