A Message from the Vice President

My first act as your new Vice President is to thank the members of the AACA NJ Region for having the confidence in me in giving me the great honor to serve as your 2023 Vice President.


I would like to provide you with a short history of my activity in automobile clubs. I became a member of the AACA, the Cougar Club of America and the Cougar Club of NJ/PA at the end of 2015 after retiring from a 40-plus year career as an Environmental Engineer and Consultant. At the beginning of 2016 I became a member of the NJ Region AACA, and later that year, a member of the Antique Truck Club of America. In 2020 I joined the Galloping Hill Cruisers Car Club. I am still a member of all these clubs, and even though I personally do not own an antique vehicle or a show car, I participate in AACA Nationals, NJ Region events, and many local car shows and cruise-in with my wife Ann's 1988 Mercury Cougar (HPOF). One day I may own a Mercury show car of my own. In 2017, after being active in NJ Region events chaired by others, I started to chair Antique Automobile Enjoyment Events at assisted living/senior living facilities, tours of private car collections, and staging antique & classic car shows. Our participation at a number of these events garnered cash donations to the NJ Region. I have continued to chair these types of events through 2022 and will continue that in 2023 and beyond. More recently, I added Antique Automobile Enjoyment Events at independent adult communities and NJ Veterans Memorial Home as well as having the Region participate in a Labor Day parade in 2022.

When I became a NJ Region Member in 2016 there were a number of members chairing events; however, in the past several years the number of active Chairpersons has decreased for various reasons. Our member count has grown in the past seven years, giving the NJ Region a total of approximately 225 members plus spouses. NJ Region events include: the Spring Meet car show; an Ice Cream Social; a dozen or more car displays at various assisted living, independent adult, nursing facilities, and Veterans homes; Memorial Day and Labor Day parades; private collection tours; a Mystery Tour; a Summer picnic; a Holiday Party; two-to-five day tours including a Spring Fling, a Summer Tour, and a Fall Foliage Tour; and an Installation of Officers and Awards Banquet. There are many opportunities for members to step up and chair an event or two. Please reach out to me if you need any help or guidance on setting up an event.

To include an event on the NJ Region's Calendar of Events, the proposed date must be cleared by the Vice President to make sure that it does not coincide with a major Region or National AACA events within a 100-mile radius of the center of the NJ Region. Once a date is cleared, the Chairperson submits a Region Activity Report to the V.P. (See Sample Form.) and a write-up describing the event details to the Road Map Editor early enough so that the write-up appears in the Road Map issue a month prior to the date of the event, for example an event in July needs to be in the June and July issues of the Road Map. This is done to ensure sufficient participation by the members. Non-members are welcome to participate at most of our events, so please invite your friends.

This is your club, and your participation is what it takes to make it successful.

Chairman should retain a copy of this form.


It is preferable that in parades we ride as a group near the front of the parade to avoid the stop and go creating overheating and clutch problems.

A final report on the event should be submitted to the vice-president on the success (or failure) of the event, whether it should be repeated, suggested changes, and the names of Region members who worked with you. This information will be forwarded to the Executive Committee.












The Controversial Topic of Collector Car Categorization

As in the past, the subject of collector car categorization always leads to some strong opinions by enthusiasts everywhere. To be clear, these categories were created, supported, and promoted by car clubs. Today these categorizations stand as industry accepted categories defining a niche and serving the collector car community.

Below are six categories that make up the core categorizations representing a large percentage of multi-marque collector cars within our hobby.

Antique - Generic term used for all autos built before 1925. Horseless Carriage: A term used to describe very early autos built at, or before the turn of the century, characterized by very slender, tall wheels and carriage-like appearance. Brass Era: Autos built 1914 and earlier, so-called for the abundant use of brass in the production process (radiator, headlights, horn, sidelights, etc.). Nickel Era: This bridges the gap between the use of brass and chrome on autos during the period from 1915 to 1928.

Classic - The term "classic" is the most overused term in the car hobby. Officially, it is a label used by the CCCA (Classic Car Club of America) to identify "fine or unusual foreign or domestic motorcars built between and including the years 1925 and 1948, distinguished for their respective fine design, high engineering standards and superior work-manship.

Hot Rod - Originally this term was used to describe the practice of taking an old, cheap car, removing weight (usually by removing roof, hood, bumpers, windscreen and fenders), lower it, change or tune the engine to give more power, add fat wheels for traction and paint it to make it stand out

Street Rod - In the 1970s hot rodders tried to clean up their reputation and thus started to use the term 'street rod' instead of "Roadster" or "Hotrod". An ingeniously simple idea re-born.

Sports Cars - or sportscar, is a small, usually two-seater, two-door automobile designed for spirited performance and nimble handling. The term "sports car" was used in The Times, London in 1919. According to USA's Merriam- Webster dictionary, USA's first known use of the term was in 1928. Sports cars started to become popular during the 1920s. In the postwar era, a "sports car" is most any car that seats two, can have a hard or soft top, and could be used for competition.

Production Car/25 Years or Older - This is a term used by the AACA to cover cars 25 years old or older that don't necessarily fall into categories such as Antique, Classic or Hot Rod and primarily deals with postwar collector cars.


Muscle Car: These are mid-sized cars built from 1964 to 1973 and characterized by large displacement, high horse-power engines. They came factory direct to dealers with the largest engines available from the manufac-turer.

Pony Car: A term originally used to describe the Ford Mustang, but later used to describe all cars built that would compete with the Mustang such as AMX, Barracu-da, Camaro, Firebird, etc.).

Special Interest: A "catch-all" category for a car of any age that has collectible attributes but is not covered by any of the preceding categories. This would include late model cars with enthusiast appeal (Buick Reatta, Cadillac Allante, and Dodge Viper), or extremely low-mileage or well-cared-for cars that normally wouldn't be collected.

Well, there you have it. If your car doesn't fit in any of the above-mentioned classifications, the only option left to consider:

Used Car - A car that is basically used as reliable transportation.

1919 Chevrolet "490"



The Chevrolet "490" was manufactured from 1916 to 1922. It was a direct competitor to the Ford "Model T". The name came from the sale price: \$490.00 or about \$650.00 with electric headlamps and a Delco starter, which was less than a "T". Henry Ford is said to have



directed his dealerships to destroy every "490' taken in trade so they would be permanently removed from use.

The "490" was built as a Roadster and a Touring Car with removable side curtains. It is powered by a three-speed transmission and a four-cylinder valve-in-head engine. The engine was rated at about 21.7 Horsepower, comparable to the "T" at 22 Horsepower. Changes and improvements were made each year of production and a closed model was introduced.



We purchased our "490" in 2018 from the estate of S. Clark Hendershot of Sussex County, NJ. Mr. Hendershot owned the Chevrolet dealership in Newton, NJ. The "490" may have been taken in as a trade and was in the family for many years. It was used in local parades and probably in the dealership showroom.

Mr. Hendershot used his staff and enlisted the help of The Hullco Garage in Layton, NJ to restore the "490" to it's present condition in the 1990's. Hullco helped us "freshen it up", after we purchased it.



In 2019 it was entered in the AACA Hershey Fall Meet to qualify for and receive a "Century Badge". It has participated in several Chevrolet four-cylinder tours for vehicles produced between 1911 to 1928, and meets sponsored by the Vintage Chevrolet Club of America.



In 2018 we transported it to Chadron, Nebraska for a show and tour to Fort Robinson. In 2019 we visited McCall, Idaho and toured the surrounding mountains and historic sites. In 2021 we visited the headwaters of the Mississippi River around Park Rapids, Minnesota. Our "490" is not the easiest vehicle to drive in our

collection, but it is always appreciated by the public and attracts attention wherever we go. Unfortunately, because it is a somewhat rare Chevrolet, it is often mistaken for a Ford "T"




Suspension Parts Springs and Shocks

Part 2: Shock Absorbers

In a vehicle suspension, springs and shock absorbers must work hand-in-hand. Will your car be able to take you from Point A to Point B without shocks? (We will use the more common "shocks" when referring to shock absorbers). The answer is an absolute 'yes'. Will your ride be comfortable? The answer to this question is a firm 'no'.

As we discussed last time in Springs and Shocks, Part 1, springs play an important role in rider comfort by allowing the car's wheels and tires to move up and down when encountering road imperfections. The springs absorb much of those motions and help isolate those movements from the passenger compartment. You've heard the statement "a body in motion tends to stay in motion", and that is true for springs. Springs, made of metal, will continue to move up and down until their stored energy is depleted. This is fine for the kiddies on the ride 'em broncos at the amusement park, but it's not much fun when traveling in your car. Shocks were introduced as a suspension element to dampen and retard the tendency of springs to keep oscillating. Together, springs and shocks provide a compliant ride which can also be fine-tuned for luxury or sportiness.




The first shocks on motor cars were of the lever-arm type, and deployed friction discs as a way to control spring movement, converting that movement into heat.

Friction discs, however, were simplistic. Later versions of lever-arm shocks substituted hydraulic fluid for the friction discs. Lever-arm shocks continued to be installed by car makers through the first half of the 20th century. (A look at a Moss Motors catalog shows that MGBs used lever-arm shocks through the end of the model run in 1980, likely one of the last cars to do so.)

Lever shocks were superseded by tubular shocks. Tubular shocks also used hydraulic oil, and chambers within the shock allowed controlled flow of the oil, meaning that engineers could adjust the amount of shock damping. More advanced shocks introduced pressurized gas in conjunction with hydraulic fluid. The tube shocks gave chassis engineers more flexibility in suspension design. The shocks in some cases became locating elements for A-arms and axles. These shocks were easy to install and replace, using some combination of either a threaded rod with a nut and/or a pressed-in bushing which could accept a bolt.



One of the biggest advancements in shock design is the MacPherson strut, named after the engineer who invented it, Earle MacPherson. The fascinating backstory is this: Earle MacPherson worked as an engineer for Chevrolet. In 1945, he was tasked with developing an entirely new small car which was to be called the Cadet. His proposed suspension design utilized a combination spring/shock, consisting of a lower portion forming a sturdy hub mount, a shock installed within this vertical tube, and a coil spring sandwiched between lower and upper spring seats. Although tall, the design was relatively compact. However, Chevrolet cancelled the Cadet project. Unhappy, MacPherson quit GM and went to work for Ford. The first production car to use MacPherson struts was a British Ford, the 1950 Consul. (American cars would not adapt MacPherson struts until the 1980s.) Today, the vast majority of passenger cars use MacPherson struts, especially in the front. The design particularly lends itself to front-wheel-drive and unibody construction.



How do you know when your springs or shocks are worn out? As mentioned last month, my experience is

that short of severe sagging or cracking, springs rarely go bad. Of course, if you're restoring a 75-year-old hulk with the intention of winning a First Senior at Hershey, I'd suggest new springs! The suspension element more likely to wear out are the shocks. One challenge is that if you've been driving the same car for 5 years and 50,000 miles, the shock wear is so gradual that you don't sense the slow degradation which occurs over time. The old "push down on the bumper and count how many times the car moves up and down" still can be used. (Anything more than once or twice up-and-down means the shocks are suspect.) If the vehicle rides poorly, or there is poor riding comfort, or there are noises from the suspension, or the handling has deteriorated (first ruling out other obvious causes like tires), then it may be the shocks. The auto repair industry would have you believe that shocks should be replaced every 50,000 miles. From my experience, most new car shocks should last twice that. Again, on a full restoration, while you have everything apart, a best practice would be to mount all new shocks of the original style as used by the manufacturer.
