Rich' Repair Ramblings July 2022 My Favorite Shop Tools Part 3 The Brake Caliper Piston Spreader

Two months ago, in the May 2022 Road Map, I rambled on about my hammer-driven impact driver. In June, it was my vernier calipers. For my third and final installment in this series, I'e chosen another simple hand tool: the brake caliper piston spreader. Disc brake system servicing is straightforward, actually easier than many people realize. One step that sometimes befuddles the home mechanic is that the new brake pads will only fit inside the caliper if the caliper pistons are pushed back into their bores. (Go way back to the October 2020 Road Map and read about the components of a disc brake system.)

Many instruction books advise using a large C clamp for this job, which is certainly doable. However, I find its use to be cumbersome. The C clamp itself is often larger and heavier than needed. An inexpensive and purpose-made tool is the "Piston spreader" which comes in a variety of shapes and sizes.

The tool I own, like so many of mine, has been in my toolbox

for decades. Frankly, I have no recollection of purchasing it; it doesn't even have a brand name on it. But mine, compared to every other version I've ever handled, is the model of simplicity. It's nothing more than two almost identical pieces of metal, hinged in the middle, with a thumb screw inserted into a threaded hole in one end. As the thumb screw is turned clockwise, the screw pushes against the opposing piece, effectively also spreading the ends on the opposite side. If these ends on the opposite side are placed inside the caliper, the resulting force pushes the piston back home in the caliper. It takes twice as long to explain as it does to do.

The tool is light and consists of only three pieces. Once I set it up, I can perform the operation with one hand, something which cannot be said for a heavy C clamp. As vehicle brake systems evolved from fixed position calipers with pistons on both sides, to sliding calipers with only one piston per side, some improvisation has become necessary. There isn't always something for my tool to push against opposite the piston, so I simply use the worn-out pad as a 'top' for the spreader tool.

When using this tool or any other tool to return the caliper piston home, remember to loosen the cap on the brake master cylinder reservoir. Should the hydraulic fluid be very full, it may not be possible to push the piston all the way back. me fluid may need to be withdrawn; you also want to be careful that you don't spill any fluid out of the reservoir when driving the piston back.

It's now interesting to reflect back on the choices I've made for "three of my favorite shop tools" None of the tools is electric, electronic, or hydraulic. Each tool cost me \$100 or less, so my choices are far from the most expensive tools I've owned. And two of the choices, the impact driver and the vernier calipers, have very general uses. This month's choice is specific to brake jobs, but is needed whenever brake pads are being replaced. Without realizing it beforehand, my three 'favorite' choices are small, simple, light, and affordable tools that make automotive repair work more convenient!




Antique Automobile Enjoyment Event at Somerset Run

Mid-Jersey Region AACA's Monthly Cruise-in Tk's Ice Cream in Cream Ridge NJ June 17, 2022





The story of Vince's Wooden Model "A" Pick-up Truck.



Vince's Wooden Truck

In 1968, I was 15 years old and my father, brother and I were looking for a project. The three of us went to look at a 1930 Model "A" Ford Tudor Sedan found in a classified advertisement that was located in Allendale, NJ. It looked terrible, but came with a pick-up truck load of extra parts.

We immediately decided to purchase the car and parts, and returned home to get my Grandfather and his pick-up, "a chain and a pipe", and some money. My mother was not happy because, we had left my brother as the "deposit".

We shortly thereafter found another 1930 Tudor Sedan that was about to be hot rodded. This vehicle had only a frame, body and front end. However, we where confident that we now had enough parts to assemble two complete cars. Over the next couple of years, we did just that.

These cars where not "restored" – they were rebuilt using what ever we had for parts. I drove the "A" as my only means of transportation for almost a year while in High School. Though it knocked, it proved to be very reliable. I still have the car. My brother drove his to High

School, but then sold it to gather the funds to buy a Corvette which is long since gone. My family eventually purchased a 1930 Model "A" Ford Coupe that was to become my sisters. I was off to college – so my brother and father rebuilt this one. However, she never really wanted the car.

When my girls where learning to drive, I often thought of my father's genius for getting us involved in those two cars. First, it encouraged us to spend plenty of time together. Secondly, once we began driving them, he knew that we would not be going to far, or too fast, nor would we do anything dumb since we had spent two years of our lives assembling those vehicles.



Chassis and Front Fenders

Fast-forward 23 years – married, two daughters – moved into our 3rd home 3 years earlier. We had completed the restoration our 22 "T" Depot Hack while living in Fanwood in 1990. This vehicle started out as a 22 Model "T" Touring car that was converted into a small flat bed truck by removing the rear seat section. Rather than keeping it this way, after a significant amount of research, we purchased plans and hardware from Hudson Wagon Works and built the body which is a very detailed replication of bodies produced in York, PA in the teen's and twenties, and then installed by Ford dealers on Ford chassis. We moved into our new home in Scotch Plains in 1992. In 1995, we were settled to the point where the idea of taking on another project was appealing, so we tore apart the "A" so that it could be properly restored. The engine was sent to Perth Amboy for a complete rebuild, and I tackled the chassis. The body was sent to a guy in Paterson who fixed and strengthened the sub-floor, re-skinned the passenger door, and generally made it much more structurally sound. The chassis was completed in 1997.

About this time, my brother decided to "hot rod" the "A" Coupe. His original thought was to restore it. However, the block was cracked, and he really wanted

something that he could drive on a regular basis. I inherited another complete 1930 chassis. Surprisingly, the Coupe chassis was "better" than my Tudor chassis. In addition, both of my daughters were in college, so we were not anxious to spend money on "fun projects" like the Model "A".



Preliminary Assembly

However, I had a basement full of woodworking tools, and a large pile of rough oak planks. The idea to build another wooden car took shape. The frame from the Coupe was cleaned, painted and assembled, less the engine, in the basement. It became the "stand" for the pick-up. Over the next couple of years, piece by piece the vehicle was assembled, with the knowledge that when it was completed, it needed to fit through a 30" door and go up a flight of steps, if it was ever to see the light of day! During this time period, anyone that entered our basement was in for quite a shock!



It Sees the Light of Day!

Except for the hood, gas tank, and radiator, there are no metal parts above the frame. The chassis is pure stock 1930 Model "A". Fenders are all ¾ inch oak, with all of the angles secured with biscuits. The paneling in the doors and cowl is double thick ¼ inch oak veneer plywood. The field of the pick-up bed is oak wanes

Original METAL Pieces

Several parts have special significance to me. The door locks, knobs and hinges where taken from my Grandparents home in Scotch Plains, shortly before it was demolished. They likely date from the late 1800's. The rear view mirrors are from the Model "A" I drove to high school and were taken from an old Volkswagen. It now has the 4-speed transmission that my grandfather had used in a doodle bug. The shift knob was made for me by my brother many years ago. The Copenhagen Model "A" Club emblem on the radiator was given to me by a friend in Denmark after I brought a speedometer gear for his friend's "AA" that could not be located in Europe. We also added dual side mounts to free-up the bed for luggage storage as we've taken this truck on a couple of tours. It also allowed for the fitment of a tonneau cover to keep our luggage covered and dry.

The truck has now been on the road for almost 25 years. It has held up better than I ever dreamed. To date, there have been no repairs to any of the wooden parts. Surprisingly, there have been no cracks or problems at all to deal with. Everybody who sees it really loves the truck!



The Interior

When it was all assembled, my wife suggested that the truck needed "a story". So here it is; and I'm sticking to it! "It was 1943, and a farmer needed a truck. He could not have afforded to buy one, even if he could have found one. Equally as distressing, his neighbor had a Model "A" that was in a serious roll over accident. While it ran well, the body was completely destroyed. The only salvageable parts, in addition to the chassis, were the hood, gas tank, and radiator. The farmer, purchased the wreck for \$10.00, dragged it home, threw away the body, and then began to assemble a small pick-up from the remaining parts. Thankfully, the farmer was a skilled wood worker, with a stock of oak to work with. What you see before you, is my take on what he would have built!



The <u>real story</u> here is that my brother wanted to hotrod the body that was originally on this chassis, a 1930 Coupe. With tuition for the two daughters in college, we were not looking to spend a lot of money. I did have the oak so I designed and built this vehicle so that I could have a Model A for parades and touring. In addition to this A, I also have a 1930 Tudor which is still in 1,000 pieces. I drove this vehicle to High School in 1970. The body is in excellent condition. It will eventually be restored. While I have no intention of making a "show car", I do intend to be sure that it is "really nice".



The Finished Truck

I've now almost completed the Coupe chassis so that the Tudor body will have a home.
