THE DON'TS YOU SHOULDN'T DO

Thirty-eight years of touring this wonderful country in antique cars, with my trusty navigator at my side, has taught me a great many lessons. Not unlike all we have done in life, experience is perhaps the greatest teacher. As many of you know, even one antique car tour can almost instantly turn a joyride through the countryside into a front seat free-for-all complete with sarcastic insinuation and sometimes the use of single digit sign language.

Many or perhaps even most of these instances could be prevented by starting one's day with driving directions that are simple, concise, and most importantly, accurate. Unfortunately, in real life, we know that you have to follow the directions first before all this can be determined.

I would be remiss in my ramblings if I didn't also mention there are a number of "don'ts" that we experienced road pilots have learned to avoid at almost any cost as they most assuredly will unleash the wrath stored somewhere deep down in the dark recesses of your navigator.

The first of the "Don'ts" that comes to mind is utterance of that all too common phrase "are you sure"? This phrase goes way beyond stirring the gastric juices of the navigator. It may very well unleash a litany of verbal assault that could make you ask yourself if you really ever knew that person. I must confess that I have a great deal of experience in this arena. I just can't help myself. When she says "turn left" and I'm thinking "turn right", my cars do what I think and we turn right. Almost simultaneously I will say "are you sure"? In my defense I contend that saying those words is merely a bodily reaction, like opening the refrigerator door at 9:30 PM for a little snack and is definitely not spoken with the intent of questioning the intelligence of the navigator. My advice on this topic is to never say those words out loud.

This next "don't" involves that well established pre-tour ritual of examining your car prior to starting the tour. It just makes good sense to give it a good going over so as to eliminate potential problems before you tour rather than on the tour. However, from time to time, while driving down the road, we drivers might suddenly recall something that we meant to check but didn't. This realization must never ever be formed into words of any language the navigator could understand. These words should never be said out loud! Doing so won't just be limited to explaining your concern. You will be required to explain when you will check it out: What might happen if you don't, what will happen when it breaks, how it would be fixed and how long will it take. On the other hand, if you don't have anything to talk about, it could be a great "icebreaker".

Don't be the first car out of the parking lot in the morning. There are fellow tourers who lay in wait. Hunkered down behind their dashboards, with engine running, they will rush up behind you at the last moment and follow you all day. They will make every wrong turn that you do. They will follow you all the way to the Walmart. They will park alongside you at the Walmart and then ask why you are there? Do you know you missed that last turn? Of course if a fellow tourer is having trouble both navigating and driving and wants to follow along for the day.....why not.

Don't ever admit that a strange noise, or knocking or vibration is not normal to the car. Since you are the operator it is imperative that you not unduly alarm the navigator and any other passengers in your car. Sometimes when this situation occurs you may have to tell a little untruth like "Yah I hear that every once in a while and it's ok" or "I think that might just be the road". My experience in this area has taught me to say "no I don't hear anything" and hope it goes away. Sometime it helps to change the subject, however asking the navigator if they have the number for the emergency truck definitely doesn't work.


Never pass on a rest room. It takes decades to gather all the life experiences we all have and that adds up to a fair amount of wear and tear on the internal machinery that keeps allowing us to climb behind that steering wheel or passenger seat and enjoy this wonderful hobby. Many of us have contracted TB (tiny bladder) over these many years and having access to a water closet goes beyond being important. Don't have to go? Try anyway.

Never ever antagonize the NAGGIGATOR. While it might seem to many as just using common sense, upsetting your navigator can almost always bring you serious neck pain. You may not be the cause of the problem or be the problem. The problem may very well be resting in that direction booklet nicely nestled on the lap of your navigator that you got when you picked up your packet on arrival for the tour. The problem may be the dried out scrambled eggs at breakfast or the severe shortage of bath towels in your bathroom. Here's a news flash......IT DON'T MATTER. Of all the things that drivers can do, this is probably the one area where we have the least control.

Lastly, upon returning to the hotel and the hospitality suite, don't tell those who would listen that your navigator screwed up and instead of visiting the fish hatchery you ended up at a dead end in East Jabip or at a topless bar in the next town over. If you must convey to all that you got lost, perhaps it would improve your relationship a bit more by just noting that you had a great day in spite of making several parking lot tour along the way.

Touring is fun and it's meant to be. I have never spoken to any fellow tourers who haven't expressed the fact that often the road least taken didn't cause a bit of front seat discomfort.

It's not planned......it's life....tour every chance you get.....it's good for the economy!





Hazards of the Hobby

When we head for the garage to work on one of our old cars, most of our spouses know to have the Band- Aids ready. Most of us that enjoy working on our own cars

know exactly what I'm talking about. A slip of the wrench, reaching around a tight angle, cutting or stripping wire or just about anything can result in little cuts and scrapes.

A couple of weeks ago I noticed a friend of mine had a nick on his forehead. He credited the corner of the hood on his Packard for the injury. Of course, I had a

similar scar from the corner of the hood on my Hudson to share with him. I guess for some of us it is just part of the price we pay for getting out and enjoying our hobby. I'm sure all of us have had bumps, blisters, bruises and scrapes, maybe even scars in the pursuit of our hobby.

Those are things we grow to expect. We do not expect injuries from more serious activities such as jacking, hoisting, burning, cutting and welding. These activities are to be taken seriously and could result in severe injury or death if all correct procedures are not followed.

So let's all get out there and have some fun... but keep the Band-Aids handy!






PAUL MYSMERY WOUR ?

MORE Steering Steering Angles to Know: Ackerman and Alignment

Last month we discussed how a steering system needs to turn both front wheels in the same direction. If both front wheels turned at the exact same angle relative to the length of the car, the tires would scrub on a turn, because the turning wheels are tracing circles of two different-sized diameters. For example, on a right-hand turn, the right (inner) wheel is following a smaller-diameter circle than the left (outer) wheel, and so the right wheel must turn in more sharply than the left wheel.

According to Wikipedia, the geometry for this was worked out almost 100 years before the advent of the automobile. It is attributed to a German carriage builder named Georg Lankensperger who devised the necessary angles in 1917. However, the actual patent was filed in England in 1818 by Rudolph Ackerman, whose name is associated with it to this day. In automotive engineering terminology, the "Ackerman angle" refers to the way the steering mechanism allows for the inner and outer wheels to turn at different angles. See Figure 1 below: In this sketch of a right-hand turn, the right front wheel is at a sharper angle than the left front wheel. According to Lankensperger/Ackerman, the correct geometry means that the lines representing the axles of both front wheels should meet at the same point on a theoretical line extending from the rear axle. Vehicles which do not adhere to the principles of the Ackerman angle will have unstable steering, especially as speeds increase, and become more prone to rollovers. Fig. 1: THE

FRONT

How do you maintain the "Ackerman angle" on your classic touring car? While there is no Ackerman angle measurement to check, keeping the vehicle's steering and front suspension in good form is the best approach. Last month we shared suggested maintenance ideas for steering systems. Steering system linkages are very close (in location AND function) with a car's front suspension. Keeping the front suspension in good condition also affects steering, and correct front end alignment is an important part of that. There are 3 alignment measurements to know about: toe, camber, and caster. While not every car allows for all 3 to be adjusted, it is a good practice to at least be familiar with what each term means.

Toe is probably the easiest alignment parameter to understand. Looking straight at the front of the car, if the front tires point inward, this is toe-in; tires which point outward are toe-out (it's the same as with our own toes!). Using my Alfa Romeo and a spare tire, I illustrated each of these parameters. See Figure 2 for toe-in and Figure 3 for toe-out.






Camber is the vertical tilt of the tire, inward or outward, at the top of the tire. Positive camber means that the top of the tire tilts outward; negative camber has the top tilting inward. Zero camber is a perfectly vertical tire. Figure 4 illustrates positive camber and Figure 5 shows negative camber.





Caster is the most difficult to describe because it's not easy to "see". It can be defined as the difference between an imaginary line formed by the upper and lower wheel anchor points, and a vertical line through the center of the wheel. If the line formed by the anchor points touches the ground ahead of the wheel's vertical line, this is positive caster. You should be familiar with "casters" on an office chair or a heavy cabinet; the concept is the same. On a chair caster, the "mounting point" is offset from the caster wheel's true vertical. When an office chair is wheeled across the floor, the caster tends to swivel so that the mounting point is ahead of the wheel's vertical; this provides directional stability and makes it easier to wheel the chair or cabinet. The same concept applies to our cars: positive caster provides good directional stability and contributes to the steering wheel self-centering after a turn.



How do you know if the alignment is out of spec? The most correct way is to put the car on an alignment rack, which allows toe, camber, and caster to be measured to within fractions of an inch. How often should this be done? There is a different answer depending on whether we are talking about your daily driver or your infrequently-driven collector car. Modern cars should probably have their alignments checked once a year. Your AACA Second-Junior, which you drive 300 miles a year, might be able to go a long time without an alignment check provided that the steering feels OK to you, and provided that you are not seeing any tire wear. One myth to dispel here, whether it's a newer car or an older one we're referring to: hitting a pothole does **NOT** knock the alignment out of spec - for pothole damage to do that, a major suspension component would be bent, and you will have issues over and above an alignment problem. Most alignments go out of spec slowly and over time, as steering and suspension components wear. That's why (and we are repeating ourselves): check those components and replace when necessary.

Before you spend the money for a full alignment at "Al's Alignment Shop", eyeball your front tires. Tire wear is an easy way to see if the alignment is out of spec. The good news is that no tools are required. The bad news is that once the tires show wear, they may need replacement. "Feathering" of the tire tread (each rib develops a sharp edge) can be felt more than seen and can indicate incorrect toe. Wear along the outer edge can indicate excess positive camber; if the inner edge is worn, then there is too much negative camber. While incorrect caster will not show up as tire wear, driving the car will provide some indication: after completing a 90 degree turn, the steering wheel should return to center with little driver input. If it does not and it used to, the caster should be checked.
