








Use Your Newsletter as a Marketing/Membership Tool By Phillip Cole, Vice President - Publications

The "Secret City" Tour- Oak Ridge, TN

April 30- May 3, 2023

Brian and I ventured down to Tennessee for the Southeastern Divisional Tour with Pete Cullen and his sister, Barbara, hosted by the Eastern Tennessee Region AACA (ETR as referred here on out). While they arrived on



Day one of the tours took the even-numbered cars to the Oak Ridge History Museum, Museum of Appalachia, and the Norris Dam Powerhouse, with a coffee stop at the Melton Lake Pavilion. The History museum gave us a glimpse into "...the human side of the Manhattan Project, focusing on history and people's dayto-day lives during World War II in Oak Ridge..." (description taken from our tour book). We truly learned why Oak Ridge is called "The Secret City." It was fascinating to learn that no one knew anything of what was happening - what they were working on; they only knew about their specific job, and they weren't allowed talk to anyone else about their work, including their own spouses and children. The Museum of Appalachia is a living history museum, complete with miniature horses, peacocks, chickens, and hogs! We had a delicious lunch, with a choice of pulled pork or pulled chicken and sides. We also got to wander around the farm and go inside the cabins and learn about day-to-day life. Pete, Barbara, Brian, and I spent a very long time here, and missed the photo op set up by ETR at the Norris Dam (oops, we didn't realize this was happening). The Norris Dam was massive; we went in the info center and found one of the guys used to live in Bound Brook! After a long day of traveling and learning, the four of us decided to try a local spot for BBQ as recommended by one of the Chamber of Commerce ladies. It was delicious!

Day two in our tour book was titled, "Poking the Bear!" This was the longest day of the tour. Our first stop was the K-25 History Center. This center is "...the exact spot where uranium was enriched for use in the first atomic bomb!" (from the tour book description), and it honors those individuals who helped construct and operate the complex; post WWII it was used to meet the needs of the nation's security and energy (paraphrased from the tour book). The men and women who worked here did not know anything more than their assigned job (as stated before), and once they discovered what they were doing, it left them with a bittersweet feeling. This was a sobering experience for me, and I wasn't even born yet - my parents weren't even born yet, so I can't imagine how these people felt at this time! We drove to the Great Smoky Mountains Heritage Center where we learned about the Native American inhabitants and pioneers and residents of the Appalachia community. We were given a boxed lunch and listened to a presentation about a local bear rescue that specializes in rescuing and rehabbing orphaned bear cubs up to two years of age; there is very little human contact to keep the

cubs as wild as possible so when they are returned to the wild, they have a better chance of survival. We perused the attached museum and drove off to Fort Loudin State Historic Park where we had a coffee stop and got to tour the grounds. This was one of the earliest British fortifications on the western frontier (1756); the British Colony of South Carolina felt threatened by French activities in the Mississippi Valley, so they built this fort



during the French and Indian War to protect the Overhill Cherokee Nation against the French (paraphrased from the tour book).

"Bombs, bars, and cars" was the theme for the final day of the tour; this was my personal favorite day of the tour where I think I had the most fun. Our first stop of the tour was to the American Museum of Science & Energy; it "...was designed to teach children and adults about energy, especially nuclear power, and to document the role Oak Ridge played in the Manhattan Project..."



(taken from the tour book). We could interact with just about EVERYTHING in this museum! It was fun to see everyone, old and young, playing with the different displays. I tried many of the activities as well, especially one of my childhood favorites, "Simon." It turns out I'm not as good at it as I once was! I almost didn't want to leave, but our next stop was the one I was most excited about (and the reason I told Brian this tour was a must): the Brushy Mountain State Penitentiary! Upon arrival, we were greeted by quite the shady character, an inmate of the Penn, only to see that it was really current AACA National President Fred Trusty. We got to tour the prison before a delicious lunch at The Captain's Table, a

restaurant on the grounds of the prison (former building purpose unknown to me). I could go on and on about this stop, but I'll attempt to keep it short. This massive penitentiary was in operation from 1896 to 2008, and reopened in 2018 as a museum; the original structure was made of wood by prisoner labor and had burned down. The current standing structure was built in 1920. The most famous escapee from this prison is James Earl Ray, who assassinated Martin Luther King, Jr. Pete, Brian, and I were stuck "behind bars" so Barbara could get our mugshots. We got to view a video of the history of the museum. Another fun fact of this prison is that it was referred to in "The Silence of the Lambs" when Dr. Lecter wanted to be put there for his cooperation in the hunt for "Buffalo Bill." Okay, okay, moving on. We got to go through some of the prison (the gallery levels above the second floor were closed, but once you've seen one cell, you've seen them all). Some tourists thought that this stop was "creepy" (a direct quote from AACA First Lady Marcia Trusty). After eating and shopping (and some moonshine tasting at the distillery attached to the restaurant) we traveled to a beautiful park where members of ETN brought out their beautiful cars for a giant car show and had some yummy ice cream. We were able to ring the International Friendship Bell (a bell given by the Japanese as a token of forgiveness after WWII). The Closing banquet was filled with photos and videos of





the tour, delicious food, and entertainment by Author and Humorist Sam Venable, who taught us how to speak Southern; Brian and I bought a few of his books, which he autographed for us. If you've never done a national tour, you should! They're a great way to get out and see things you might not ever get to and meet some fantastic fellow AACA members along the way!

Polishing vs Waxing: They're not the same!

When I was a teenager not yet in possession of a driver's license, my desire to be around automobiles knew no bounds. Sometime after my Aunt Rita took delivery of her gorgeous new 1968 Olds Cutlass S 2-door hardtop, I offered to wax it for her. At my request, my dad bought a \$5 can of Classic Car Wax, which was heavily advertised in *Car & Driver* magazine at the time ("the best wax job ever, or your money back". It was my first time using the stuff, and I don' think I had ever waxed a car before. It was hard work just to dig the material out of the can, much less spread it on the paint and buff it off. At the end of a laborious 3 or 4 hours, my young teenage self was exhausted. After that, I didn't wax another car for several years.



At that time, I knew nothing about paint treatment, and I believed that the harder the wax, and the more pressure that was applied during application, the better. I could not have been more wrong. Yes, the main ingredient in that can of Classic Car Wax was carnauba, a hard wax. However, the application of wax is intended

only to provide a protective outer coating... But we'e getting a little ahead of ourselves. In last month's Ramblings, we detailed the proper way to wash your car. Presuming that your jalopy is now clean, you are ready to treat its paint, which could be a year old or decades old, depending on its state of preservation or restoration. I am not a "body and paint man" by any means, so any significant damage to a car's topcoat is beyond the scope of my capabilities. But I have learned a lot in recent years about the plethora of consumer-grade paint treatments available from name-brand suppliers.

Bear in mind that all my recommendations below involve HAND application only. The use of a randomorbital or rotary buffer can potentially provide faster and better results, if used properly. They can also ruin your paint if used without care. I have limited experience with such machines, and when dealing with older cars, I prefer to err on the side of caution and apply these paint treatments by hand.

When starting the process of "shining up" one of your prized AACA-eligible possessions, perhaps the most important step is evaluating the condition of the paint. How old is the paint job? If it' an HPOF car then it's likely to be the original factory finish. Remember that older cars did not use a top clearcoat, which was not introduced until sometime in the late '70s - early '80s. Also, some manufacturers used clearcoat on some colors and not on others. My 1993 Mazda Miata is a prime example, as Mazda's metallic colors got a clear coat while solid colors, such as my black car, did not. When your trophy-winner was repainted it may or may not have had two-stage, or basecoat/clearcoat, paint applied. Ideally, you have that information at hand.

The point is this: cars WITHOUT a clear topcoat should be treated differently than those with it. Both my cars, the '67 Alfa and the Miata, are single-stage, that is, non-clearcoat paint. When I wax those cars, some of the color is removed and shows up on the cloth I'm using, so I need to use extra care. If I'm treating a modern car with a harder clearcoat on top, I can be a little more aggressive in my approach.

During your evaluation, examine the paint for swirls, water marks, and similar "effects" in the paint itself. Your choices come down to using one or more of the following products: clay bar; rubbing compound; polish; and wax. The clay bar is a cleaning step that takes you above and beyond what a washing can remove. I have successfully used a clay bar to remove contaminants that the eye can't see. Clay bars should be used with a quick cleaner with high lubricity, like Meguiar's Final Inspection, and after its use, the surface should feel very smooth if not necessarily shiny.

For your next step, always start with the least aggressive method, and remember that an overall goal is to not harm the paint. You can always go back and apply

something stronger, but if you start with something that is too aggressive, you could end up damaging the paint. After the clay bar treatment, a rubbing compound would be most aggressive. I could only recommend it if there are significant defects in the finish, but on a singlestage paint job, one should exercise caution. For minor defects like dullness and oxidation, a polish is less aggressive and serves two purposes: it treats small problems while also nourishing the paint and restoring some color and depth. In recent years, I have become a fan of Meguiar' #7 Show Car Glaze, which is designed for hand-application only, and is promoted as a pure polish to bring back luster to dull or faded paint. A little bit of elbow grease may be called for when using a rubbing compound or a polish, as you are working the product into the surface. When finished, the color should be very uniform and have a certain depth to it. It still may not be as bright and shiny as you would like, but that is the job of the final step, which is the wax.

I said at the top of this article that I was exhausted after that first application of hard wax. And this brings me to a major point: waxing a car should not require a lot of muscular effort! The effort comes earlier when removing defects. Wax is nothing more than a protective coat on top of the paint, applied after any previous treatments. Whether you use a paste, lotion, or liquid is up to you.

Some are easier to apply than others, and some last longer than others, but none should be laborious to apply if you've properly prepared the surface.

My final suggestion is: if this is all new to you, try practicing on a non-collector car first. Maybe there is an older vehicle in the family fleet with a neglected finish which you could tackle. If something goes awry while polishing a 15-year-old Ford (no offense to Ford fans!), it becomes a learning lesson. You can also use this approach to try products from different manufacturers to see which ones you prefer. Above all, have fun with it, and enjoy your shiny car!





Staten Island Region AACA 16th Annual Spring Dust-off Car Show And Flea Market

For several years, I have been trying to get to the Staten Island Region AACA's (SIRAACA's) Spring Dust-Off. With weather reports mostly favorable and not having anything else planned (on purpose), I was all set to go out to Staten Island. When I woke up on Sunday morning, April 23, 2023, it was raining very steadily, so I checked the weather report again and saw that it was supposed to clear up. At around 9:15 AM I called Mike Signorile, SIRAACA's coordinator for this event, to find out what the weather in Staten Island was like, he said it was still



raining, but was clearing up. Shortly after 10 AM, I called Mike again as it stopped raining in Middlesex and the roads were starting to dry out. Mike indicated it had also stopped in Staten Island and more cars were starting to arrive. I grabbed my keys, hopped into Ann's 1988 Mercury Cougar LS Special Edition, and headed for the Common Café parking lot. I arrived approximately 40 minutes later and was greeted by several of the SIRAACA members I have befriended over the past five or six years and was guided to a prime parking space by their Vice President and friend Artie Guarnieri. Artie mentioned to me that with all of the commitments and costs incurred, they were committed to having the show. Once I had settled in, I grabbed my camera and proceeded to check





out the beautiful cars and trucks that were already on display as more and more vehicles keep coming in through the registration area. As I walked around, I noticed many beautiful and interesting vehicles and another plus was that I kept bumping into members of the AACA and other local clubs that I have befriended over the past several years. These clubs include but are not limited to the following: the Verrazano Cadillac Club, Staten Island Kar Klub, Legendary Muscle Car Club, and the Staten Island Pontiac Club. By the end of the show, it turned out that SIRAACA's Spring Dust-Off only had 160 vehicles competing for the 26 special awards unique to this spring event. The Spring Dust-Off usually has double that number of vehicles.



SIRAACA show coordinators decided to leave their red carpet in their 1963 Chevrolet Step-Van to stay dry, however; they still paraded the award winners up to the trophy table as the awards were announced by Staten Island Region President Paul Arena, Jr. This procedure gives us photographers an opportunity to take pictures of all of the winners, or at least your favorite vehicles as they drove by with trophy in hand. The 26 special awards included the following: Decade Awards for the 1950's through the 2020's; marques or vehicle types including Best Corvette, Best Cadillac, Best Ford, Best Mopar, Best GM, Best Orphan, Best Truck, Best Foreign, and Best

Survivor. Other Awards included: Favorite Custom, Future Collectible, the Class of 1973 Award, and the Buick 120 Award. Two Best in Show Awards went to a prewar and a post-war vehicle.



My favorite vehicles were the 1924 Ford Model T Touring which was displayed by the NY City Fire Department, a 1929 Ford Model A roadster, the 1959 Fiat 1200 Spider (Roma) with body by Pininfarina that took one of the two Best in Show Trophies, a 1957 Mack truck resto-mod driven by a very interesting young couple, a 1968 Chevy Camaro, Steve's 1973 Pontiac Catalina (AACA HPOF) that took the 50-year award, the Cadillac limo ordered by Jackie Gleason, Sal's 1972 Cadillac Coupe DeVille (Best Survivor award), and William's 1964 Galaxie 500XL (Best Ford and a NJ car). William's last name is Ungar but is not related to the Ungar Family that were/are members of the NJ Region according to NJ Region Member Dan Ungar.



The Staten Island Region raffles off a car each year and for the past 5 or 6 years I have always purchased a book of tickets as the cars were at least 25 years old, but this year the raffle car was an early 2000's vehicle that I would not have wanted, but I purchased raffle tickets anyway to support their Region. I was told that approximately \$1,500 in raffle tickets were sold this day.



It seems that everyone was willing to spend a few dollars today as the winning share on the 50/50 was \$510 and the food take-out from the Common Café, which donates all of its profits to charity, was non-stop. Despite the early rain and late start, today was a remarkably successful day for all that participated. I am looking forward to SIRAACA's 46th Annual Fall Show on September 17th. Hope to see more New Jersey folks there.

When I look at my pictures, I reflect on the fact that



this was the best display of cars and trucks, pre-war to present day, that I have seen so far this year other than for our Spring Meet in May. The other thing I reflect on when I think about this gathering is, why don't the local AACA Regions get together more often, and why don't more of the NJ Region members show off their cars to the rest of the NJ Region membership? Thank you reading my article and I hope to see more NJ Region members and their beautiful antiques at local car shows, displays, and cruise-ins. Please note that, as I always say, this is your club, and your participation is what it takes to make it successful.






