

#### 4<sup>th</sup> Program Interview: Paul Wolfmeyer, on HAM Radio Club

Vince DeLisi, Program Chairperson, conducted the interview of Region Member and current President Paul Wolfmeyer on his involvement in the HAM Radio Club. The floor was then opened for other members to ask questions or comment.

Vince: How long have you been a member of the NJ Region, and AACA?

Paul: NJ Region 2001, but it was difficult to attend meetings due to the organ job I had, it was a requirement to attend choir rehearsals, and they were on Thursdays until I convinced them to move to Wednesdays so I could attend the meetings. AACA, it must have been the early 90's, I think.

Vince: A longtime member of AACA. I think you're a MOPAR quy, right?

Paul: I am a MOPAR guy. I forgot my little flashy badge that says MOPARs from '32 up to '05, yes.

Vince: So, you've got from '32 up to '05...how many?

Paul: Oh, 8 or 9...My wife is here!

Vince: It's probably 12 or 13! What are you working on at this moment?

Paul: I'm working on a '49 DeSoto convertible that we've been working on. I bought the first one in 2001 and it is actually close to coming home. So, after 23 years, it still has a couple of little things, but the restorer wants to get it out of his shop.

Vince: As long as you send him a check...

Paul: Oh, he's already got my money.

Vince: Let's talk a little bit about the radio club. Can you describe a little bit about what's involved, and how you became involved in it?

Paul: Radio amateurs started back around the nineteen-teens with folks that were interested in talking to other folks and playing with transmissions to make communications, and I was not licensed in the nineteens. I was licensed in the mid-sixties. There are classes of licenses that start out from technician, general class, and then there's an advanced (which doesn't exist anymore), which I am, and then an extra class. You're licensed by the FCC. HAM radio is a very diverse kind of hobby, and there are folks in it simply to build things or work other stations to see how many they could work either at the high-frequency bands or the VHF bands. There are folks who are on repeaters, and folks who do moon-bounce.

Vince: Literally bounce the signals off the moon?

Paul: That's right, yes. This Saturday there's an eclipse, and there's a whole gang of HAMs that are going to be on the air transmitting to see what happens with the transmissions as the ionosphere changes. The ionosphere- the layers above the Earth are what reflect radio waves, and from night to day, the depths of those change and the eclipse suddenly in a period of three hours you go from day to night back to day. I listened to a program last night where there's a group that wants to do experiments about that. There's a lot of activity; there are different modes. Some people like to what's called ragchew. That's where they get on the air and shoot the ball back and forth. There are folks that like to operate CW.

Vince: What's CW?

Paul: A continuous wave- that's Morse Code. It's still around; it used to be a requirement for the license, but they got rid of it. There are still people learning it- it's a very reliable means to communicate. In about 2017, a

new mode was invented- a digital mode called FT8, invented by a Princeton Noble Laureate- Joe Taylor. You're transmitting using your computer and trying to work as many people as far as you can. It's a very short exchange of your call-sign and signal report and what grid square you're in. You take the whole world and spread it out into squares and give them all a code. I'm FN-20-RS.

Vince: That's a license plate, isn't it?

Paul: No, my license plate is my HAM call: W2PTP.

Vince: So that's different from your license number?

Paul: The grid square is, yes. That's specifically telling a location.

Vince: Yeah, 'cause I'm not sure if anyone noticed his license plate is a little different.

Paul: W2PTP- Papa Tango Papa. I sometimes say W2-Pink Toilet Paper...sometimes it's easier to remember it that way, but it's actually Papa Tango Papa.

Vince: Can you talk about some interesting things that have happened when you were on the radio?

Paul: One fun thing, when we lived back in Cincinnati I did a bunch of public service activities, and there was a bicycle event every year called the Tour of the Shiota River Valley; it went from Columbus down to Portsmouthone hundred miles. The HAM clubs would station HAMs about every two miles, and using repeaters, antennas, and our equipment we would maintain contact with where these bicycle riders were. I worked the Saturday of it. If they needed to find somebody it never went over five minutes, and we located a rider along the hundred miles. I found that pretty exciting, but I was a young buck then; I was married, but I was a young buck.

Vince: How much equipment does it take to get involved in this sort of thing...or is that a dangerous question?

Paul: No, I've got a basement full of equipment. You can do it with relatively inexpensive equipment.

Vince: Do you have to have those big antennas over your-

Paul: No, I have a wire antenna, although I have it strung in a couple of trees and now the branches have grown over the antenna. I just got ahold of the arborist to come and do the pruning- it's about three grand. Normally you think of wire antennas as pretty cheap.

Vince: So, it is an affordable hobby if someone wants to get involved in it?

Paul: Yes, it can be. And I try to make it affordable!

Vince: I go by houses sometimes and you see those big antennas- they look like they're trying to contact outer space.

Paul: Yes, beam antennas are great, and they enable

you to get more direction out of your signal. Now, some of our New Jersey communities are not very fond of them, and there were laws passed that declare the HAMs rights to do that. But you know when you get to near as old as I am, contracting to get a tower in there and put a cement base...what does your widow do when you die? She already wonders what does she do with my cars when I die so, so much for that.

Vince: Hemmings Motor News or Bob Abbott can help...

Paul: Or the Classic Auto Mall (west of Philly).

Vince: Approximately how many HAM operators are there in the world, do you know?

Paul: 700,000; now they're not all active...I think that's in the country, actually. Activity has gone down because people think they can communicate with cell phones, and you can, but you know what? The cell network could go down, too, and be a disaster, so there's a public service aspect to this as well.

Vince: Is there an international language?

Paul: Actually, it's English, which I find a little shameful but it is.

Vince: That's terrific. Does anybody have any questions?

#### **Other Member Questions & Comments:**

Question: What's the furthest place you've made contact with somebody?

Paul: Um, Australia. Usually, the best time to do that for me is in the morning about 7 A.M. Conditions change-there are sunspot cycles that go up and down, and right now we're coming to the peak of what's called solar cycle 25...which is pretty good.

Question: If the power grid goes down in the U.S., can you still communicate?

Paul: If we have generators, yes. Some of you may know Mayberry Sales out in Port Murray sells Honda and snowblowers- the owner was not a HAM, but knew HAMs were doing a lot from a public service standpoint and offered little Honda generators at about a ten percent discount. Every year we do have what's called field dayand I maintain I'm too old to be out camping-but my particular club sets up at Governor Livingston Berkeley Heights (a relatively high location) and will throw up our antennas and portable masts if we need to and tents and operate three stations. That's a fun event for me. What I find nice about it is sometimes after you get a license, people are kinda mic-shy and just don't get on the air. There are a number of folks that I know come to field day and have been able to get started Hamming and doing it and gotten very active.

Vince: How many members are in your local club?

Paul: Oh, maybe about fifty.

Vince: That's a good-sized club.

Paul: There's a lot of clubs, yeah.

Bill P.: There are three million HAM operators worldwide.

Paul: Three million? You just googled that? Okay, so 700,000 is how many are in the U.S.

Question: were you ever able to integrate the two hobbies together?

Paul: Uh, no not directly, although I have operated mobile, and operating mobile's another fun activity back in the early 70's, I used to go from Kansas City to by where my wife's farm was in Iowa and pick them up. There are roughly three thousand eighty eight counties in the U.S. and "county hunting" was an activity- you get points and you try and win awards and so forth, but this friend of mine that I worked with and he said, "You know some of these counties in the U.S., if you go out of your way a little and help some guys get some counties, so I turned a four hour trip into an eight hour trip. I had great fun. I'd pull into a county and pull over to the side of the road and get my rig from the car, and of course cars via mobile, your signal doesn't get out as well, but when you're in a sought-after county, everybody hears ya, and so there are huge pileups...so that was a lot of fun.

Vince: I really wish my wife was here- she thinks I'm a fountain of useless information! This is great! I suspect that most of us in this room are fountains of useless information, but that's fantastic!

Question: I remember in the fifties and sixties a lot of guys had mobile rigs with the big antenna- do they still do that?

Paul: Oh, yeah! Every so often there are a lot of HAM fests that clubs will sponsor every year, and when you go to a HAM fest, if you look at the parking lot, you'll see some vehicles that will just amaze you with the number of antennas they have sticking up all over. My dad and I used to operate mobile to mobile, and I'd have two whips off the back bumper which I could switch from inside the car, switch bands, and we'd maintain communication during a long trip.

Vince: So, a lot of us in the car hobby, we're like a couple of different generations- that's the key, it sounds like it started with your dad?

Paul: it did, yeah.

Vince: A lot of us are multi-generational with this stuff. I'm not surprised that that came out near the end of the presentation. Are there any other questions? Okay. I want to thank Paul for filling it in and now I'm going to have to find somebody else as the anchor in case the person who is supposed to present is absent.

#### **Air Conditioning, Part 2: Refrigerant**

You might be familiar with the term "freon" and use it to identify air conditioning refrigerant. However, like Band-Aid and Kleenex, which are examples of registered trademarks used by the public as generic terms, "Freon" is a registered trademark, owned by Chemours (formerly DuPont). Automotive Freon is also commonly called R-12 or CFC-12. As was briefly mentioned last month, Freon was invented in the 1930s, and its non-toxic and non-flammable properties made it the best choice over other chemicals.

Automotive air conditioning installation grew rapidly in this country throughout the '60s and '70s, and that also drove the need to service and repair these systems. Since Freon is a gas moving through rubber hoses, there is always some small loss of refrigerant over time (called permeability). It is not unusual for A/C systems to require a "topping off" of refrigerant every few years. This could be done at a repair shop, or, conveniently, could be done by the owner at home. Small cans of R-12 were available in all auto parts stores (PHOTO #1). If an owner was trying to avoid spending money on a repair, s/he could keep replenishing the refrigerant instead of spending the bucks to fix a leak.



If an A/C system required a component replacement, the system would be emptied first. The service manuals at the time stated: open the valve and allow the Freon to escape to the atmosphere. Again, it was non-toxic and non-flammable, so there was no concern, or so we thought. As far back as 1974, scientists studying the atmosphere began to determine that the earth's protective ozone layer was being depleted, and CFCs were cited as one of the chemicals causing this ozone

depletion. The 1987 Montreal Protocol required the phaseout of this class of chemicals, including R-12. A substitute was needed, and in a rare case of the global automotive manufacturers working together toward a common goal, HFC-134a was designated as the best alternative. By model year 1994, 100% of factory-installed automotive A/C systems used HFC-134a, also referred to as R-134a.

During the work on this changeover, the industry wanted to minimize any risk of mixing R-12 and R-134a. It's not that doing so would be dangerous; the main concern was that such contamination would ruin the supply and make it unusable. A key design difference are the service valves. It's basically impossible to connect an R-12 supply to an R-134a service valve and vice versa.





(PHOTOS #2 & #3) Another objective was the ability to change over a vehicle built with an R-12 system to operate on R-134a. Since R-12 production was being phased out, this would allow older cars to continue to have serviceable A/C systems. Again, cooperation among the car manufacturers resulted in the production of "retrofit kits", which convert CFC-12 systems to HFC-134a. In this way, older vehicles could keep their air conditioning functional, and could use the more affordable and more widely available R-134a instead of R-12.

#### **Mustang Car Show, Columbia NJ**

The Garden State Region Mustang Club (GSRMC) held its "Mustangs & Merlot" car show at the Brook Hollow Winery in Columbia NJ on Sunday Oct. 15, 2023. The GSRMC President is also a member of the NJ Region of the AACA, and he requested a team of AACA volunteers with some judging experience to judge the Mustangs. Doing it this way would maintain impartiality, as none of the 6 judges were displaying cars. I agreed to be one of the 6, along with Craig Kunz, Pete Cullen, Anthony Cecala, Dick Bettle, and Alex Soultanis, and we were split into 3 teams of 2.



Cars were divided into classes: first, either "stock" or "modified", then by generation. (The "modified" distinction was made by GSRMC officers, and not the judges. Any cars with 3 or more mods were placed in the modified class.) My co-judge and I judged 5 stock classes: 1964-1966 cars, 1967-1970 cars, Fox-body cars, 1994-2004 cars, and 2015-2023 cars. While that sounds like a large number, there were 6 cars in the '64-'66 class,



only 2 in the '67-'70 class, only ONE Fox-body car, and only 2 cars in the 1994-2004 class. The big numbers were in the 2015-and-up class which had 11 cars. (Again, these numbers reflect cars in the STOCK class only.) I estimated that there were about 50 cars on the show field.

As a former Mustang owner and GSRMC member, I was genuinely surprised at the very low turnout for all pre-2005 cars. Mike D., GSRMC President whom I've known for many years, told me a while back that club membership has taken a decided turn toward late-model vehicles. At least this speaks well of the continued

enthusiasm for the Mustang among newer and presumably younger owners.



Cars were judged on workmanship and appearance (condition and cleanliness) only, so none of us were expected to be Mustang experts. Still, especially among the newer cars, judging became very tight when points were being subtracted for demerits as small as dirty floor mats, paint nicks, and less-than-stellar engine compartments. Our task was made easier because we only had to select one winner per class. We were not looking for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place winners.



I took my photos before judging started, knowing that cars would leave as soon as winners were announced. In many cases, as you can see, hoods and trunks were open as required, so I had to accept that in my pictures. After the previous day's rain, everyone was thrilled that it was dry, but a brisk breeze and a peek-a-boo sun meant jackets stayed on. I greatly enjoyed being immersed ever so briefly among Mustangs again, and I saw one or two that would look really nice in my garage!

#### The "Davis Special" goes to Seattle






The origin of the rolling chassis is unknown. The rolling chassis photo would indicate that the vehicle was not driven a long distance from Shipshewana, Indiana. The continental engine is believed to be a 1907 Type K. Based upon the location and engine, the likely candidates for the chassis are: Auburn, Klinger, Model, Decatur, Economy, Harper, Studebaker, American simplex.


### **Production Cars Made in Indiana**


The trip started in September 1912 and followed the route in the figure below. The route was determined from captions and dates on photographs taken during the journey.





"Reed on the bridge crossing the Mississippi River at Clinton, Iowa. The weather was warm and notice the car looks clean at this stage of the trip. September 1912"





"This is the 63 miles of dessert we crossed. 50 miles without water. We carried a can along. This is between Pocatello Idaho and Boysie City, Idaho"

The caption is my grandfathers' writing which was transcribed onto the back of the original print.



"This is at Martin Idaho, camp the same night we crossed the 63 miles of dessert. The little tent is the two land agents that camped that night. There was some beautiful scenery though we went around these hills to the left had rough roads for 40 miles. Saw ducks galore but hard to get near. September 28"



"This is near where we shot the jack rabbits near Boysie, Idaho. We ate lunch on the other side of the rock. This is sage brush growing here. It was Sunday September 29 we went through Boysie City at 4 pm.

That day we camped about 30 miles on the other side of Boysie."



"Crossing the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon at Olds Ferry. Here is where the car nearly went in the river as it was a steep grade at the landing and when I started off it pushed the ferry back in the river, but I started in time to save us. This old man runs the ferry, you can see his home across the river that is in Idaho, this side Oregon. September 30"



"Reed is behind the car. This is not very good but it's a cordoroy bridge in the Snoqualmie Pass in the Cascades. We had road like this for miles with steep grades. The rig behind is a man and a mule. We had lots of fun with him"

Once they settled in Seattle, the Davis Special morphed from the run about into the family car (see photos below). When I took possession, it had the covered body which was severely deteriorated (beyond reasonable restoration). The original rolling chassis is being returned to the cross-country version.




