

# In Memoriam Dr Albert Fredrick Gaal Jr

(NJAACA @#1419)

On November 7, 2023, at the age of 93, Dr. Albert Frederick Gaal Jr. passed away. He was born in Irvington, New Jersey in 1930. After earning his doctorate degree from Penn State College of Optometry, Albert served in the Army's Medical Services Corps from 1954 to 1956. Following his military service, he joined his father's optometric practice, returning to Irvington.

He is preceded by his wife, Dorothea, and his son, William. Albert is survived by his daughter, Marcie (Eric) Metzler, as well as his grandchildren, Dr. Antoinette (Bryan) Martin, Albert Metzler, Taylor Gaal, and Katherine Gaal.

Albert was deeply involved in various Irvington organizations, including serving as the Lions Club president, being a part of the Board of Education, Jay-Cees, Chamber of Commerce, and a town Councilman.

In In the early '70s, Albert and his family made a new home in Oldwick, NJ, where he resided for over 50 years. He continued his engagement with the community, serving as the VP and president of the local Early Ford V8 Car Club from 1972, and a long standing member of the Tewksbury Historical Society and the NJAACA. Another passion was judging National meets for the early Ford V8 Club specializing in wagons.

Al was known for his love of storytelling, his passion for tinkering with cars, exploring antiques, and preserving his old home's history. He will be remembered for his genuine love of life, unwavering friendship, and the joy he brought to those around him. Rest in peace, Albert; your legacy lives on in our hearts and memories.

# **Tour Guide** By **Fred Trusty** 2023 AACA National President

This year I've had the opportunity to participate in all but one AACA tour and talked with quite a few "freshman tourists" who said they wish they had discovered the touring side of the hobby long ago. Not knowing the guidelines for each type of tour can create some apprehension to registering for your first tour so let's look at the various tours.

- Reliability Tour The Reliability Tour is sponsored during even-numbered years for brass era cars, i.e., those manufactured in 1915 or earlier. This includes all recognized vehicles of that vintage.
- 2. **Revival AAA Glidden Tour**® The AACA sponsors the Revival AAA Glidden Tour® during evennumbered years (2022, 2024, etc.) in cooperation with the Vintage Motor Car Club of America (VMCCA). The VMCCA sponsors the tour during the odd-numbered years. The Revival AAA Glidden Tours® are for the older vehicles and eligibility for AACA sponsored tours is limited to those manufac-tured in 1942 or earlier. Generally, this tour is held during the 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> week of September.
- 3. **Founders Tour** The Founders Tour is sponsored annually for all vehicles, except race vehicles, manufactured from 1932 through a production year 25 years prior to the year of the tour.
- 4. **Vintage Tour** The Vintage Tour is sponsored during odd-numbered years for vehicles manufactured in 1931 or earlier.
- 5. **Sentimental Tour** -- The Sentimental Tour is sponsored during even-numbered years, beginning in 2004, and is for vehicles manufactured from 1928 through 1958, except race vehicles.
- 6. **Divisional Tours** -- The AACA sponsors two Divisional Tours annually during even-numbered years, one in the Central and one in the Eastern geographical regions, and during odd-numbered years, one in the Southeastern Region and one in the Western Region. These tours are designed to be shorter in duration (minimum three days) than the traditional five-day

tours. The host Region or Chapter is free to decide which vehicles are eligible to participate in any Divisional Tour, except race vehicles will not be included. However, all vehicles must be of a production year at least 25 years prior to the year of the tour.

If you would like more information on touring you can go to aaca.org, click on the "Publications" tab and then "Policy & Procedures Manual." Section 4 has everything you ever wanted to know about touring.

# A/C Part 3, Diagnosis & Repair

If you have A/C in your AACA auto, you enjoy it during the summer, and it's no fun when it stops working. Before presuming that an A/C repair will cost mucho bucks and is beyond your skill set, let's do as we should always do when diagnosing a problem: start simply, and follow a logical progression. Below are the steps to perform visual checks, electrical checks, and functional checks.

VISUAL CHECKS: Open the hood and locate the A/C compressor and its drive belt. Is the belt in position and correctly tensioned? With the engine OFF, press on the belt and estimate the deflection: it should about 1/2 inch. If the belt is loose or missing, fix that first! With a properly tensioned belt in place, start the engine and turn on the A/C. Observe the clutch on the front of the compressor: does it rotate? If it does NOT, you may have an issue with the clutch; if it DOES and you get no cold air, it is likely that the system is low on refrigerant. Note that on air conditioning-equipped cars, the A/C compressor


belt is always turning. There is a clutch on the front of the compressor which engages (turns) and disengages (does not turn). On a properly working system, you will see this clutch cycle through engagements and disengagements.

Continue the visual checks with other underhood items. Locate these components: besides the engine-mounted compressor, there is the condenser (in front of the radiator), the receiver/drier (bottle-shaped, usually in the engine compartment), and the connecting pipes and hoses. Refer to photo for typical locations for a 1960s-era car. (The evaporator is much less accessible, located under the dash next to the heater core.) Are all these components in

place and undamaged? Ensure that the condenser is not blocked from debris or damaged from impact (it's not uncommon for a rock to hit it and damage it). Eyeball all A/C hoses and pipes to make sure none are split, bent, or show signs of leakage. (I've seen an A/C line burst open after touching a hot part of the engine.) At the compressor, ensure that electrical connections at the clutch are secure. Find the receiver/drier, with a sight glass on top. With the engine running and the A/C on, you should see refrigerant flow past, with no bubbles visible. Bubbles indicate low refrigerant. If nothing is flowing, the system is likely low or empty.

ELECTRICAL CHECKS: Start with the blower motor. All modern cars have an integrated HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, Air conditioning) system with one blower motor. Your jalopy may have an "add on" A/C with a separate blower motor. Turn on the A/C blower motor and ensure that it works at all speeds. Many vehicles are wired such that the blower motor must function for the A/C to operate. If the blower motor doesn't work, check and replace its fuse if necessary. (See the Feb. 2020 Rich's Repair Ramblings for a refresher on checking fuses.) If it's not the fuse, repair the blower motor before going further with the air conditioning.

**FUNCTIONAL CHECKS:** If the blower motor works and the A/C compressor clutch spins but you're still getting warm air out the vents, the car's heater may be stuck on (this has happened to me). Do this test,



preferably on a day with moderate or cool temperature: Warm up the engine and turn the A/C OFF. Move the heater control through its full range, from lowest to highest settings. With it "off", air from the vents should be as cool as ambient (outside) air. If the dash vent air is warmer than outside air with the heater off, you could have a stuck or leaky control valve. Repair this before proceeding further with any A/C repairs.

If the clutch engages, the blower motor works, and the heater control valve closes, yet there is no cold air, it is now likely that the system is low on refrigerant. (Newer cars have a low-pressure cut-off which will disengage the compressor if the refrigerant is low.) What kind of refrigerant is in the car? As discussed in a previous Ramblings, both R-12 (Freon) and R-134a are in use. By 1994, all vehicle manufacturers switched to 134a. But an older vehicle may have had a retrofit kit installed, allowing the more available R-134a to be used. Auto parts stores carry service cans of R-134a, allowing the home DIYer to top off the system. Determine the type of refrigerant, and obtain some if possible. (Be advised that R-12 is very expensive.)

To top up a system, you only need a small can of refrigerant, and a service hose to connect the can and the car (the hose is often sold with the can). Keep the can upright and attach the hose to the can, but keep the valve closed. Locate the "low side service valve" on an A/C pipe under the hood. If in doubt, consult your car's service manual. Attach the other end of the hose to the low-side connection. Start the engine, turn on the A/C, and then open the valve at the can. Keep the can upright (if you're holding it, it will become very cold), and refrigerant will be drawn into the car's system. Occasionally check the air temperature at the vents (a thermometer is handy here) and also check the sight glass. As the vent air gets cold and the bubbles go away, you will be done.

This repair does not work if the system is completely empty; in that case, more complex equipment such as a vacuum pump and a set of A/C manifold gauges are needed. Such a repair is best done by a qualified repair shop. If you've gone this far, be satisfied that you can speak intelligently to the technician about your findings!

When I arrived back home and checked my emails later that evening, I had the following message from our


