Our 1936 Packard 120 Touring Sedan

The story starts some time ago when Walt was 12 years old and became a car guy. That is when he could spot most of the cars on the road and could tell what make they were. He saved his money from odd jobs, birthday and Christmas gifts so he could buy one when he turned 17 when he was old enough to get a license and drive in 1965. The first car was a 1958 Pontiac Bonneville convertible that cost \$500 that was his high school daily driver. That was sold after a year and then he bought a 1960 Chevy Impala convertible. That Chevy was sold and replaced by a 1965 Pontiac GTO with three twos and a four speed which became his daily driver in college: Villanova University.

The GTO was responsible for finding Veronica. Walt's roommate Bob at Villanova, had a girlfriend at nearby Cabrini University but no car so, his girl Mary told



Bob she would find a date for Walt so we could double date. Veronica was the blind date and she and Walt have been together ever since.

Walt graduated in 1969 got a job working for Exxon Engineering and thought the GTO was not a good fit for corporate America so he traded that for a 1964 Lincoln convertible. The Lincoln was his daily driver for two years until he and Veronica were married in 1971. Veronica



came with a 1966 Oldsmobile Vista Cruiser. That became the family station wagon and Walt sold off the Lincoln and bought a 1968 Chevy Caprice that was more practical.

For the next 30 years we had family wagons and regular cars for daily drivers while we raised our three sons. With college tuition to pay for there was no extra money for a collector car. Our sons did listen to Walt telling car stories from his younger days so when they became of age they too got their own cars: a '88 Jeep, a '73 Corvette and a '68 Dodge Charger for their high school and college rides. At one time we had 7 cars in the family.





After our sons left in 2000 to get jobs and left the nest we had free time. Walt decided it was time to buy back one of his old rides but Veronica came up with another idea: buy something you never had! We bought a new 2003 Corvette that was a 50th Anniversary Edition that we still have. It was a lot of fun and then Walt wanted a pre—war car since he liked all those mobster movies from the 30s. Hemmings had a feature story in 2008 "Packard's Elegantly Affordable 120. That started a quest to find one which took a year of searching. We found it in Ohio, bid on it and won. We hired an inspector who graded it#2 and



the seller offered to deliver it. The first time we saw it was when it showed up in the street in front of our house in October 2009. We have done four weddings with it and numerous outings with both our Packard club and AACA. Our grandchildren love to go out in it too.

We have made many happy memories and good friends from wonderful outings and events. It was certainly a great find.

A Visit to The 3 Dog Garage 15 South Madison Street, Boyertown PA Saturday, January 13, 2024

In 2020, I visited the 3 Dog Garage which houses Ross Myers's collection of famous race cars, hot rods, antique, classic and specialty cars, and motorcycles. Drive Belts, an Introduction

My copy of Merriam-Webster's Desk Dictionary (yes, I keep a print dictionary near my desk) provides several definitions of the noun "belt", one of which is "a flexible continuous band to communicate motion or convey material". Couldn't have said it better myself. Almost all of our AACA-eligible cars have one or more such belts in the engine compartment, which are more precisely called auxiliary drive belts. Drive belts are necessary to "drive", or rotate, certain devices which are external to the engine. Two of the most important devices are the engine's water pump, and the electrical generator (or alternator).

It is a common misconception to confuse an auxiliary drive belt with the engine's timing belt. From my experience dealing with car owners over the last 40 years, this misunderstanding is widespread, partly driven by terminology (both are rubber belts, and both are at the front of the engine). Let's put aside any discussion of engine timing belts for now and stay focused on the auxiliary drive belts.


How does such a belt get its power? In other words, what makes an auxiliary belt move? In the simplest of

schemes, an engine will have but one drive belt. wrapping itself around 3 pulleys: one pulley each on the crankshaft, the water pump, and the alternator (I'll stay with this term whether your vehicle has a generator or alternator). With the engine "off", nothing is moving. Once the engine is started, the spinning crankshaft rotates the belt. and the belt in

turn rotates the impeller within the water pump, and the armature within the alternator. The water pump can now circulate coolant to control engine temperature, and the alternator can recharge the battery and keep all electrical systems humming. For this drive belt to do its job, it must be correctly tensioned: too loose, and it will slip on the pulleys, causing the water pump and alternator to rotate too slowly; too tight, and the belt and/or pulleys might break, causing damage. The alternator is mounted on brackets, and the mounting bolts and nuts pass through slotted openings, allowing the alternator to move closer to or further away from the engine, thereby changing belt tension.

The auxiliary drive belt is made of rubber, and is subject to wear and degradation. Over time, the belt might stretch and become loose. The rubber could dry out and develop cracks. The belt's contact surface against the pulleys could become glazed and start to slip, even with correct tension. In a worst-case scenario, the auxiliary drive belt breaks, at which point, both the water pump and alternator cease to rotate. Now the engine is subject to overheating, if the battery doesn't lose all its charge first.

An important part of routine maintenance on our AACA jalopies is regular inspection, adjustment, and replacement of our auxiliary drive belts. Inspection is performed with the engine off, of course. Push with your thumb against the belt at a halfway point between two pulleys. The belt should deflect approximately ½". Too little deflection means it's too tight, and too much deflection means it's too loose. Twist the belt so that you



can see the underside. Can you spot any cracks? (A strong flashlight is helpful for this examination.) How old is the belt? What do you mean, you don't know? Don't you keep service records?? As a best practice, I recommend replacing any belt that is more than 7 or 8 years old. Many wise drivers of older cars carry a spare belt in the trunk as cheap insurance.

The situation becomes more complex if your vehicle has accessories like power steering and air conditioning. Cars with power steering have a power steering pump mounted at the front of the engine, driven by an auxiliary drive belt. Ditto with the A/C, only in this case it's the A/C compressor which is belt-driven. Your car may have 2 or 3 drive belts, all of which need to be serviced as described above. (Many vehicles built in the last 20 years or so have reverted to a single "serpentine" belt, which we will discuss in a future issue of the Ramblings.) Now if the P/S or A/C belt breaks, you may not be stranded, but you will be driving with very heavy steering effort, and if it's hot out, you won't be doing that in air-conditioned comfort.

Replacing the belt is relatively simple: perhaps most importantly, be certain to get the correct sized one! A toolong or too-short belt will not be able to be adjusted correctly, if you can get it over the pulleys at all. Loosen the component which adjusts belt tension (on many old cars, it's the alternator), and slide the alternator toward the engine, effectively moving two pulleys closer together. You should be able to simply remove the belt off the pulleys. (On cars with more than one drive belt, you sometimes must remove another belt first to gain access to the "bad" belt.) Loop the new belt over the pulleys, being certain that it is centered in the pulley's grooves. Using a pry bar or large screwdriver, pry the alternator away from the engine until the correct tension is achieved, then tighten the hold-down bolts. Caution! Be careful where you pry! Don't pry against anything breakable, and don't pry near wiring connections! You may need to try different spots to find the best place to pry. Check the belt tension and readjust it if necessary -a second set of hands in the garage is helpful for this step.
